The scholarships are based on the following stipulations: that the student receive at least a 2.0 or c grade average while carrying a minimum of 15 semester hours during the fall semester and that she adheres to standards set by BYU. The letter pointed out that the scholarships for succeeding years may be granted upon receipt of official application and meeting of competition for that particular year.

Miss Bair recently moved to Nyssa to complete her high school education. She brought with her an enviable record of scholastic achievement as well as experience through consistent involvement in activities both in school and outside of school.
