## AIRWAYS SAFETY COURSE SLATED APRIL 29-30 AT TVCC

'Principles of Air Traffic Control' will be theme of Operation 'Rain Check' to be conducted from 6:30 to 10:30 p.m., Monday and Tuesday, April 29-30, by the Boise FAA Control Tower at Treasure Valley Community college.

This eight-hour course will give general aviation instrument pilots an opportunity to learn about the air traffic control system. Applications for Operation 'Rain Check' may be obtained at airports and flying

schools in the Ontario area. Further information may be obtained by calling Ontario Flight Service, Inc., 889-9197; Aviation coordinator at Treasure Valley Community college, 889-6493; or the Boise Control Tower, 342-2711, ext. 500.

Discussions will be held on the nation's airspace, radar services, navigational aids, flight plan processing, plus many other facets of air traffic control. Supplemented by motion pictures and other visual aids, the control of instrument flights (both terminal and enroute) will be discussed at length.

## P.O. Provides Way To Avoid Offensive Mail

Mail patrons offended by pandering advertisements can now take steps to curb such mail. Postmaster Dail said April 8 in announcing plans for administering a new law which gives each family the right to decide that an ad is "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

When an advertisement sent through the mail is offensive on these grounds, a postal patron can now ask the post office to direct the mailer to send no more mail to him and to remove immediately the patron's name from all mailing lists he owns, controls or rents.

### Pamphlet Tells How

To assist patrons, the Post Office Department has published a brief pamphlet -- How You Can Curb Pandering Advertisements -- which is now available at the local Post Office. In addition to explaining how the law works, the pocket-

size leaflet contains a form letter one can use when sending his complaint to the Post Office.

The pamphlet explains that when a patron receives an advertisement, which is, in his opinion, pandering, he must send the ad, its envelope and the form letter, or one which includes its language, to his post office with the words, "Request for prohibitory order" on the face of the envelope.

Postmaster Dail said: "This new law should give some protection to American families offended by advertisements they believe to be morally harmful, particularly to their children." "Last year the post office Department received some 140,000 complaints from those offended by pandering advertisements. While in most cases the ads were not legally obscene, and were therefore mailable, they were often offensive and usually not the type of material one would want his children to read," Postmaster Dail, said.

### Patron Decides

He added that because the law gives the patron the sole right to decide what is offensive, and does not deny others the right to receive the same mail, the Congress felt it does not violate Constitutional guarantees of freedom of speech.

While the patron's complaint will only be directed to the sender, Postmaster Dail believes that one or two complaints will provide substantial protection because "the great bulk of this advertisement comes from fewer than 20 so-called 'Smut Dealers' who are frequently swapping mailing lists."

### Penalty Provided

If a mailer does not strike a complainant's name from this mailing list, and the patrons receives second mailing 30 days after the firm has received the prohibitory order, he may bring the matter to the attention of the postmaster issuing the initial order by writing him and enclosing the second pandering ad with its envelope. If the mailer still fails to respect the order, the Postmaster General may ask the Attorney General to apply for a Federal Court order directing compliance. Failure to obey the order is punishable by a fine or imprisonment.
