Hunting Seasons To Be Discussed At Burns Session

Citizens of southeast Oregon are advised that the Game Commission will hold a public meeting in the Burns Museum Building in Burns on Wednesday evening, May 1. The meeting will convene at 7:30 p.m.

Phil Schneider, state game director, said that the purpose of the meeting is to provide citizens of southeast Oregon an opportunity to present information and to make recommendations relating to the 1968 hunting seasons.

The public meeting will be open for discussion on upland game birds and waterfowl as well as big game. If time permits, other subjects may be brought before the Commission for consideration. Schneider advised hunters that the regular public hearing to establish the 1968 big game rules will be held in Portland on May 24 and the final regulations adopted on June 7.

Schneider pointed out that the opening dates for the deer and elk seasons were considered by the Commission at a previous public hearing in Portland on April 5. At that time the Commission agreed to open the general deer season on October 5, the Rocky Mountain elk season on November 2, and the Roosevelt elk season on November 16.

In addition to the Burns meeting, Schneider said the Commission held a public meeting in Bend in late April and will hold another meeting next week in La Grande.

WW I Veterans Meet

Richly illustrated with photographs of plants and wildlife, majestic scenery, and historic sites, the atlas contains pictorial maps of five western regions. The maps show lands administered by Federal agencies and symbols locate hundreds of points of interest.

More than 450 million acres of public land are managed by the Bureau of Land Management, considerably more than by all other Federal agencies combined. On the 16 million acres of BLM land in Oregon and Washington, 'Room To Roam' describes sites for hundreds of vacation travel adventures.

"Visitor attractions include camping and picnicking sites, opportunities for sportsmen and rockhounds and a boundless variety of scenery," points out BLM State Director Archie D. Craft.

"Recreational resources--managed in balance with timber, range, wildlife, water, and mineral values of the land--are assets to be enjoyed now but protected for future generations," he said.
