They are reprinted here, as they should be in all American publications from time to time, as a reminder of principles whose strength has been proved repeatedly in the course of our nation's history.

I believe in the supreme worth of the individual and in his right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

I believe that every right implies a responsibility; every opportunity, an obligation; every possession, a duty.

I believe that the law was made for man and not man for the law; that government is the servant of the people and not the master.

I believe in the dignity of labor, whether with head or hand; that the world owes no man a living but that it owes every man an opportunity to make a living.

I believe that thrift is essential to well ordered living and that economy is a prime requisite of a sound financial structure, whether in government, business or personal affairs.

I believe in the sacredness of a promise, that a man's word should be as good as his bond; that character -- not wealth or power or position -- is of supreme worth.

I believe that the rendering of useful service is the common duty of mankind and that only in the purifying fire of sacrifice is the dross of selfishness consumed and the greatness of the human soul set free.

I believe in an all-wise and all-loving God, named by whatever name, and that the individual's highest fulfillment, greatest happiness and widest usefulness are to be found in living in harmony with His will.

I believe that love is the greatest thing in the world; that it alone can overcome hate; that right can and will triumph over might. - A.O.I.

May 19 at Nyssa Methodist church. Articles for the clothing drive should be packed in boxes and clothing pickup will be Sunday, tied securely.

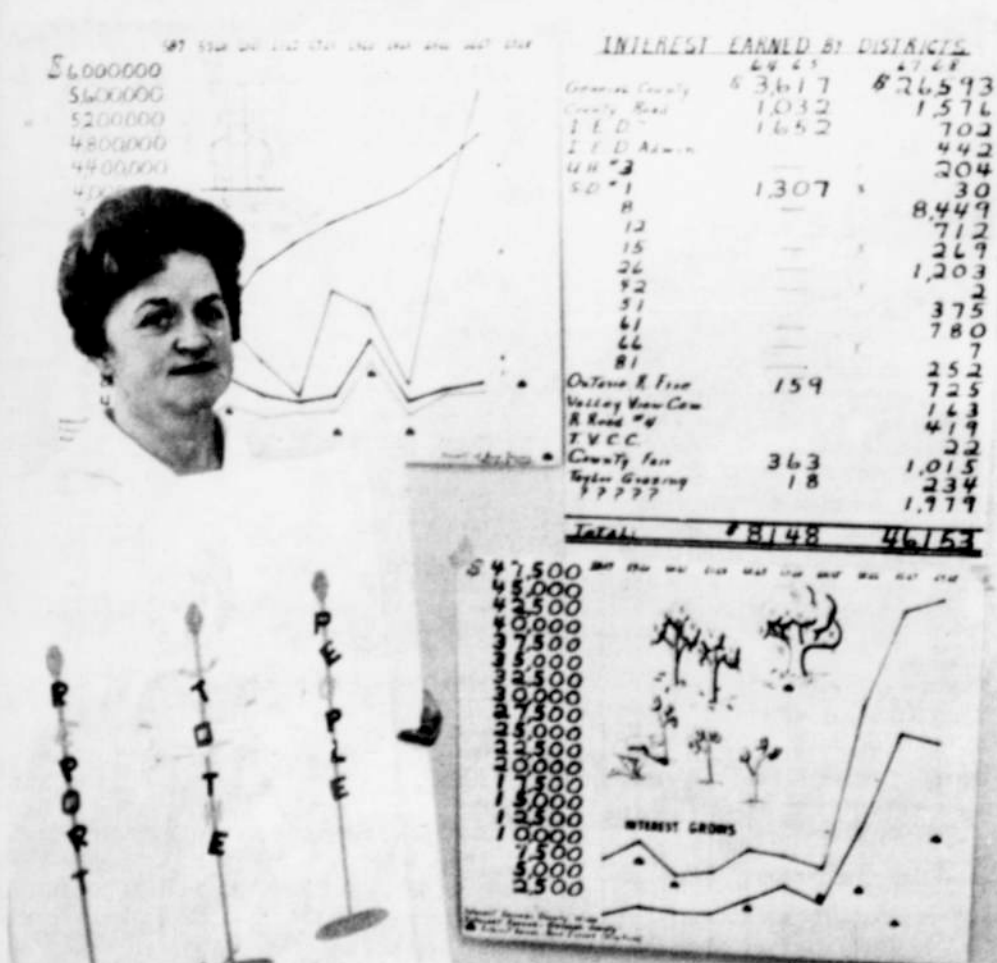

LETTER TO EDITOR

Nyssa, Oregon
May 7, 1968

To The Interested Taxpayer:

How many of us are aware of the measure being supported in the executive committee of Associated Oregon Industries to an initiative measure permitting the legislature to attach emergency clauses to tax bills?

This would mean permitting emergency clauses decided on by legislature that would prevent referendum attacks against tax measures. Which, in the final analysis, means the property owner no longer would have any power at the polls in relation to legislative expenditures for the word 'emergency' has no limitations.

Certainly the hour is here when all property owners should take the not only long view, but the very short one of where we are headed on this tax question. It is not what we would like to have, but what we can afford to have. Do we dare to give any legislature carte blanche or these issues with all their restrictions removed? I say 'No', though I usually have a measure of my own family in the legislature.

Also, just what constitutes the executive committee of Associated Industries? Let us learn the answer to this. The manner in which we tell those about us we are experiencing pain is to groan. If you are not in accord with this proposed measure, groan to Salem - and make it loud.

Stream flows so low, with most rivers already below late summer flows and many tributaries dry or down to a bare trickle. Steelhead in the John Day this spring had a difficult time finding spawning tributaries, with many creeks too low for the fish to even enter. Jim Hewkin, biologist at John Day, said the situation appears even more dismal for spring chinook, which could now be moving up the John Day, since the main stream flow is already critical to upstream passage.

The Game Commission will not stock fingerling trout in several impoundments in the Malheur area unless the water situation improves considerably in the near future. These reservoirs include Beulah, Antelope, Bully Creek, and Cottonwood Creek. Stocking the Malheur River is also doubtful since Warm Springs Reservoir is expected to run out of water by fall, thus drying up the river except for shallow pool areas.
