POTATOES STILL TOP INSPECTIONS

Potatoes were the only fresh market commodity checked by

federal-state shipping point inspectors in April that showed an increase over the previous month.

The April total of 2,505 cars of fresh market potatoes was

an increase of 148 cars over March. However, it was a different story for both the diversion potatoes -- potatoes used for starch and animal feed -- and processing potatoes. Diversion potatoes were down to 1,292 cars in April from 2,535 cars in March. The April figure for processing potatoes was 1,633 tons compared with 5,139 tons in March.

The overall drop in inspections resulted in 654 fewer cars inspected in April than March. The total for April was 2,807 cars. Fresh onions showed the greatest decline, dropping from 544 cars in March to 22 in April. Other commodities covered by April inspections were: Apples, 73 cars; pears, 104 cars; walnuts, one car; and brine cherries, 102 cars.

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FIRE CALLS!

Two small houses were destroyed and another set ablaze in a fire on the night of May 8 at the Merledean Robbins ranch on Gem avenue, north of Nyssa.

Fire Chief Delbert Malloy reported the fire destroyed a pump house and another small storage building. In one of the structures was a washer, dryer and two deep freezers, which were destroyed.

Firemen were able to save the Robbins' dwelling where damage was limited mostly to smoke.
