FINANCIAL FIASO FACTORS

Contributing factors to the federal financial fiasco: Fulton Lewis, III, in his publication "Exclusive" (February 14, 1968), uncovered some odd items in President Johnson's budget for fiscal year 1969 which the President said was a "tight" budget and "I have trimmed this budget down to our most absolute needs. . . . One of these "absolute needs" is a provision for \$62,000 in federal funds to finance a study of the provocative subject "The Social Life of the Blackbird" . . . Other federal grants for "absolute needs" include "An Ecology of Blackbird Social Organization"; \$11,200 for a study of "Competition and Social Organization in Mixed Colonies of Blackbirds"; \$29,000 for a study of "Social and Political Participation by Urban Residents"; grants of \$9,100 for "Comparative Studies of Social Behavior and Communication in the Tenrecs of Madagascar," and \$15,300 to study the "Life and Work of Andre-Marie Ampere" . . . Other grants included \$44,900 for "Determinants of Occupational and Educational Ambition Among Adolescents" and \$50,800 to study "The Bokhara Dialect of Persian" . . . Mr. Lewis, apparently with tongue in cheek, commented "if the President had only bothered to mention in his State of the Union Address that he needed a ten percent income surtax to help finance these worthwhile projects, I am certain we all would have volunteered the necessary funds!"

Funeral services for Claude Victor Smith were conducted Wednesday afternoon, May 22, 1968 at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Arthur Skogan, pastor of Nyssa Conservative Baptist church.

Mr. Smith succumbed Monday at the home of his sister, Mrs. Charlotte McGinnis at Adrian.

He was born April 7, 1893 in the Owyhee community, southwest of Nyssa and attended school in that area.

At an early age, he moved to Caldwell to clerk in a store, and it was there that he married Marie Wisner on October 6, 1914.

The deceased was a member of the National Guard prior to World War I. He returned to the Owyhee in 1917 and farmed until 1950 when he began carpentering. He worked at this trade until his death.

In addition to his sister of Adrian, Mr. Smith is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Vivian Booth of Quincy, Wash., and Mrs. Maxine Dennis of rural Nyssa; his mother, Mrs. Laura Smith of Adrian and one brother, Cecil Smith, also of Adrian.
