



IT WAS A LUCKY DAY for Jim Keele, pilot of this Grauman TBM, who was flying in from Phoenix, Ariz., to Ontario. It happened about 10:20 yesterday morning, May 22, 1968. Shortly after the aircraft ran out of gas, Keele landed in Roy Hiral's soft beet field and taxied to a halt, just a short distance from the farm buildings of the George Colemans on the Southwest outskirts of Nyssa. The spray-plane was purchased for the Ontario Flight service and Keele was taking it to its new home. On Keele's behalf, this Journal reporter will come to his defense as he seemed to be somewhat embarrassed over the incident. It was his first time to fly this particular plane, and it was learned that the gas

guage was not working properly. (The reporter has the same trouble with an automobile). This photo was snapped shortly after the gas truck arrived on the scene. Keele is on the right wing of the aircraft, with Mike Jones, OFS owner, just above the cockpit. Mrs. Keele and small daughter, Shelley can be seen just under the propeller. When the Journal photographer left the scene, Keele planned to taxi the plane back across the field and take off in the same direction in which he landed, toward Ontario, only a few air-miles from the trouble site.
