THE POPULAR GLASS CERAMIC UTENSILS are easy to clean, but a few special tips on care will save you time.

Discoloration from overcooked foods can be removed by soaking in diluted household bleach. Erase metal marks by rubbing with cleansing powder on a damp cloth.

To take off hard water and tea stains, add two tablespoons of vinegar per quart of water and boil in the utensil for a few minutes. Then wash pan to remove traces of vinegar.

HUGH STRICKLAND INTO RODEO'S HALL OF FAME

Hugh Strickland, whose rodeo career has spanned the years from before World War I through the Thirties, has been inducted into the Rodeo Hall of Fame.

The board of trustees of the National Cowboy Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center, headed by New Mexico's well-known Albert K. Mitchell, made the selection in executive session April 19, at Oklahoma City.

"Strick," who was born in 1888 in Southwestern Idaho, Owyhee county, and died in 1941, becomes the fifteenth rodeo great to be so honored, posthumously.

Raised on a ranch (his father, Red Strickland was one of Idaho's biggest horse owners) Hugh ran wild horses as a boy and started his contesting career while still in his teens.

A fine all-around contestant, he rode saddle broncs - winning that event at Cheyenne's Frontier Days in 1916 - wrestled steers, roped calves and steers;

and on occasion entered trick riding and trick roping, both competitive events in those days.

Irby Mundy, one of the game's top ropers during his contesting years, now a hale and hearty 78 years old and retired at Colorado Springs, remembers, "Strick was one of the best bucking horse riders I ever saw. There was a saying in those days that once Hugh got 'that Strickland hold' on one you couldn't buck him off."

"His wife, Mabel Delong Strickland was a pretty fair hand with a rope herself. She and Lucille Mulhall were the

only two women I can recall back then who tied down steers in exhibition."

Always a good horseman, Hugh, in his later years on the west coast, gained fame as the originator, and manufacturer, of the Strickland hackamore bit, made of aluminum, which became a favorite of rodeo cowboys and other western horsemen. It was one of the first of its kind ever on the market.

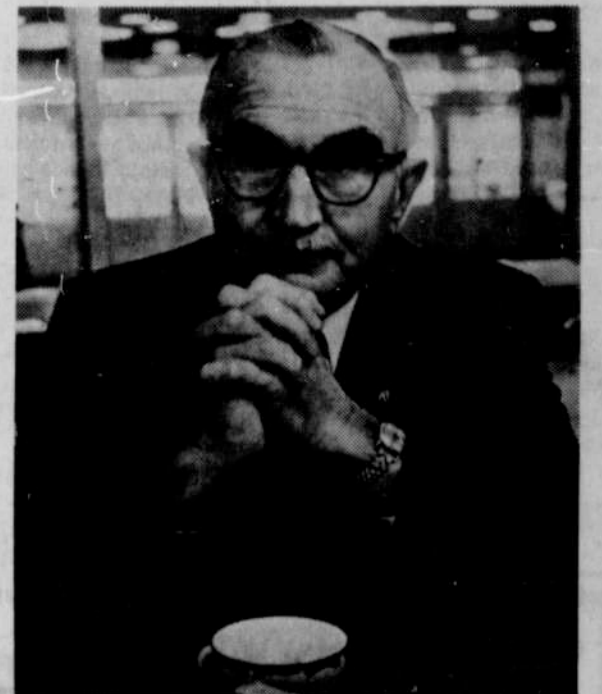
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
