## Idaho Power Ceases

### Hauling Fishermen Into Hells Canyon

Idaho Power Company announced Wednesday it has discontinued weekend shuttle-bus service to steelhead fishing grounds on the Snake River below Hells Canyon Dam because the run appears to be over and interest has tapered off.

The service, started by the utility early in January for the convenience of fishermen, was ended with trips last weekend, according to H. R. Moore, vice-president for power production.

Wendell Smith, Idaho Power fish biologist, reported that 549 spotters transported by the buses caught a total of 149 steelhead between January 6 and May 4.

"That figures out to one steelhead for every 3.68 fisherman, which is very good for steelhead fishing," Smith said.

The biologist said the best time to try for steelhead appeared to be in April, when 55 fish were landed by anglers below the hydro project. Twenty-two steelhead were caught in January, 18 in February, and 54 in March.

Idaho Power's buses transported the fishermen on Saturdays and Sundays between a gate at Big Bar and the steelhead grounds, nine miles downstream.

Moore said the gate, which is maintained by the project contractor, will be removed late this summer after heavy equipment has been removed and cleanup is finished at the huge dam.

"This will give fishermen and other visitors full access to the project area," the utility executive said.

## PRICE-COST SQUEEZE CONTINUES TO FORCE OUT OREGON FARMERS

By 1975, the number of farms in Oregon will dwindle to approximately 25,000 if the current trend continues. This statement by the Agri-Business Council closely follows a similar prediction made in California.

Farmers are going out of business in Oregon at the rate of 1,300 a year. In 1950, the state boasted of a healthy agricultural economy for its 59,827 farms. Today, agriculture is far from healthy and the number of Oregon farms has dropped to less than 36,000.

Meanwhile, the Council of California Growers notes that its state will see a decrease from today's 65,000 farms to 30,000 or 35,000 by 1975 unless something is done to make farming more profitable.
