In addition to his widow, Sarah of the home, Mr. Hobson is survived by two sons, Richard of Leoti, Kans., and Joe Hobson of Ontario; three daughters, Mrs. Martha Langley of Nyssa, Mrs. Dorothy Kimball of Oakland, Calif., and Mrs. Eleanor Brewer of Nyssa.

Also surviving are 13 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren; one brother, Albert Hobson of Leoti, Kans.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Herbert P. and Sarah Hobson; two sisters, Nell and Laura; and two grandchildren.

Funeral rites for Emory John Hobson were conducted Monday morning, May 27, 1968 at Nyssa Church of the Nazarene. Officiating was the Rev. Robert W. Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery, under direction of Lienkaemper chapel.

Mr. Hobson succumbed Friday at his home southwest of Nyssa, following a sudden attack.

He was born May 1, 1888 at Rockford, Ill., and at the age of 12 years, moved with his parents to Texas where they resided for a year. The family then moved to Roswell, N. M.

The deceased spent his younger years on a cattle ranch and helped his father with the family business in Roswell. While still a young man, he also worked on a cattle ranch, managed a confectionary business and worked in the steel mills at Gary, Ind.

He was operating a confectionary business in Artesia, N. M., when he met and married Sarah Owen on July 28, 1910.

Later the Hobsons farmed near Sylvia, Kans., and then operated a dry-land wheat farm near Leoti, Kans.

Mr. Hobson was instrumental in starting the Sunnyside Church of the Nazarene and was a charter member of that church. He also helped to organize the Western Kansas Holiness association, was a charter member and served as its president for several years. The association is still conducting annual conventions.

The family moved to Nyssa in 1938, pioneered on the new Owyhee irrigation project and cleared the sagebrush off of 160 acres of land.

The deceased was an active member of the American Farm Bureau Federation for many years, and was assisting with the 1968 membership campaign. He was also a member of the Malheur Alfalfa Seed Growers association.

Mr. Hobson served as a Sunday school teacher and superintendent in the Nyssa Nazarene

boards of educational institutions - who discourage the use of violence and lawlessness and who work to solve the educational problems which tend to produce disruption.

The most entertaining speaker at the convention was Dr. Haim Ginott, author of the phenomenally successful book "Between Parent and Child." He spoke with the skill of a professional comedian and kept his audience in stitches for most of his forty-minute address, with stories drawn by common experiences of daily life. They served to illustrate his more serious points.

He stated "When a child does something wrong or something clumsy, don't attack his personality nor his character - Learn from what we do in the therapy room - criticism is not helpful among loved ones."

At the 'books and authors' luncheon, Authoress Jessamyn West came from her Napa Valley home to talk about her favorite subject 'reading.' Miss West, author of "The Friendly Persuasion" and "Cress Delehanty" says, "There should be a real effort on the part of parents to get the best for their children, and that includes the best of books."

Miss West defines a 'dirty book' as one which falsifies life. "The truth is never dirty, although it can be read too early perhaps." She does not believe in restricting the reading of the young, principally because she does not believe it can be done. Parents and teachers can, however, be verbal advocates of good books.
