WELFARE PATIENTS REQUIRED TO WORK WHEN ABLE-BODIED

Able-bodied welfare recipients must take whatever seasonal jobs are available this summer.

"Both State and Federal welfare laws say a man isn't eligible for help if he turns down a job without good reason," explained Malheur County Welfare Administrator Caroline Craig.

These requirements don't apply to the aged, blind or disabled, Miss Craig said, nor to mothers needed at home to care for small children.

Those affected will be mainly heads of families who needed help during the winter when no jobs were available. Adults without children aren't given welfare help at any time of year if they're able to work.

In Malheur County, seasonal work is usually available from May through October in agricultural employment.

Miss Craig said most families are expected to support themselves during that time. Welfare can supplement only if earnings aren't enough to cover basic living costs.

"We can't keep people on welfare when workers are urgently needed on the farms," she declared. "Welfare's job is to help only those who can't take care of themselves."

Miss Craig said more children are expected to take summer jobs this year under a new policy which lets children keep what they earn instead of deducting it from the family's welfare check.
