### 4-H CLUB YOUTHS COMPLETE WEEKLONG SESSION AT OSU

Nineteen hundred tired 4-H club members from throughout Oregon left for their homes June 15 after attending the 53rd annual summer school at Oregon State university in Corvallis.

They had good reason to be tired. During their stay the 4-H'ers attended classes, participated in social events, competed in sports, listened to top-flight entertainers and were exposed to a college atmosphere.

The 4-H Summer School used to last for two weeks, but it has since been shortened to one, keeping the young people busy from the time they get out of bed until they drop back in at night.

Classes have changed since 4-H Summer school began in earnest in 1916 as a regular feature of the youth education program of the OSU Extension service.

Fifty-two years ago, the girls received instruction in cooking, sewing, physical education and heard talks about "Women's Influence," while the boys studied livestock, soils, milk testing and weed control.

This year's Summer School offered classes in subjects as diverse as karate, art appreciation, financial planning for education, recreation and song leadership, leathercraft, modeling, microbiology and electricity, among many others.

This is a far cry from the days when agriculture and home economics were the sole curriculum.

Twenty-six different subjects were offered in all, with nine of the 26 being offered for the first time.

OSU staff and extension workers taught most of the classes, but specialists from outside the campus added their knowledge to the classrooms. Among the 175 instructors -- OSU faculty, county extension agents, high school teachers and others -- 30 industry representatives who were in Corvallis to teach classes.

New this year was a series of career exploration discussions led by members of the Marketing Executive Club of Portland. They represented such firms as Addressograph, Eastern Airlines, Jantzen, Hertz Corporation, J. I. Case, Remington Rand and 3M Business Products.

Oregon businesses contributed entertainment as well as education. The Oregon Bankers Association presented "Sing, Out Portland Up With People," a singing program. Refreshments for post-hootenanny parties were provided by the Portland Bottling Co.

Burton Hutton, State 4-H Leader, said that the Summer School was originally envisioned as a place for boys and girls to take advantage of opportunities offered on a college campus.

"This is still true today," he said. "During the half century of 4-H Summer Schools, almost 40,000 young Oregonians have attended classes in scientific developments in agriculture, home economics, natural resources and related fields, plus developing their potentials for leadership."

In addition to developing knowledge and skills, and providing the experience of living and sharing with other young people, 4-H Summer School serves still another purpose, according to Ruth Brasher, State Extension agent for 4-H. "Many young people have

There will be a leathercraft session at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, June 25 at the Dick Miller home. - Kent Miller, reporter.

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


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
