Bob Kleemann, (riding a sorrel horse, leading a packed palomino and mule, with his dog riding the mule) came through Nyssa about 2 p.m. Thursday, June 27. He camped at the Nyssa Snake river park overnight. Members of the Journal staff met him there and learned a little more about his dream of riding all of the 'major trails' of 1848. He said he had an 1848 map to guide him.

He said he was carrying a sour-dough mix, originally brought across the plains by a family with the Smith wagon train of 1864 from Illinois to Oregon City, following the Oregon and Barlow trails.



Kleemann is a former business man and said he had a business and law degree from the University of Southern California at Los Angeles.

He started his trek from Sutters' Fort at Sacramento on March 22, this year. He stated he would be gone at least three years as he plans to go from here to Independence, Mo., then to the Northeastern part of New York state, always following the old trails.

From New York state he will visit all of the original colonies to North Carolina, then west on the Wilderness trail (also known as Boone trail) to St. Joseph, Mo., where he will pick up the Gila or Santa

Fe Trail to San Diego, and then North to Sacramento. He reported that he is carrying only the bare necessities and when out of money he stops and works.

Kleemann carries a tape recorder to take down information which will be helpful when he settles down to write a book of his experiences.

He was married August 18, 1963. His wife is a second-grade teacher in the Sacramento school system. During the summer months she meets him at pre-arranged towns. Nyssa was one of their meeting places. (The above photos were taken at the river park. One was snapped while the traveler was eating lunch Thursday afternoon.
