The unit in which Mrs. Haroldson is seated is a restraint chair with detachable tray on which patients can eat, do handiwork or play games, The other is a commode chair with removable upholstery so that it can be used while giving baths or even showers. Both have large casters for use as wheel-chairs. Mrs. Haroldson is among present nursing home residents. Mrs. Bennett, who has been a part time member of the nursing staff, for the past ten years, took over her present duties in September last year.
