Mark Hatfield Reveals Why He's For Nixon

Petition Drive Made To Place Blake On Ballot

A drive is underway to obtain 23,600 signatures on petitions to place the name of Walter S. Blake on the November ballot for State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Blake has been considered as a possible candidate for the office since the resignation of Leon P. Minear several weeks ago. Blake has not announced his candidacy. He has stated that he will be willing to run providing enough financial support can be obtained to finance a campaign.

The petition drive will be sponsored by the Support Better Education Committee, a recently organized group.

Charles Arnold, spokesman for the committee, explained: "Our committee feels that the people of Oregon should have a choice in selecting the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. Just two years ago the people voted that they wanted to retain the right to elect the state superintendent. The only way to give the people a choice in November is to have more than one name on the ballot."

Innovation In Human Relations Key To Professional Projection At First Western Drug Institute

"The time gap between reality of situations and our ability to deal with them will be closed by professional ideas and innovation." That statement by Dr. Paul H. Blachly, Associate Professor of Psychiatry, University of Oregon Medical School, has set the pace for a unique and provocative "knuckle-down" series of professional discussions and presentations covering the drug problems facing all phases of our social and business life today.

The First Annual Western Institute of Drug Problems is cooperatively sponsored by the Oregon State System of Higher Education through the Division of Continuing Education and the Oregon Mental Health Division, Alcohol and Drug Section. The Institute will be held on the Portland State College campus August 12 to 16. Participants will include internationally recognized scholars and professionals from the human

Blake, former dean of students at Willamette University, came within a whisker of upsetting Minear in 1966. Minear won only on the strength of his margin in Multnomah county, where the Oregon Education Association waged a vigorous campaign in his behalf.

For the past two years, Blake has been executive secretary of the Council of Oregon Education, an organization dedicated to improving education in Oregon.
