Dear Mr. Utt:

In regard to pending gun bills, S3604, S3605 and NR17735, I sincerely hope you are aware that if any bill passes requiring re-registration of firearms which respectable self-controlled civilians already have, with retroactive penalty for failure to do so, or causing further legal hardship to obtain ammunition, Congress can expect all honorable men to consider themselves outlawed by law foreign to them and foreign to the first law of Nature.

The penalty for such a dastardly unconstitutional law, a historically proven move for total disarmament of the people themselves and contrary to basic American concept, will not be paid merely by responsible men with sense to think seriously, the entire nation can be provoked into civil war by virtue of natural instinct to preserve. In the name of high God, do not underestimate Nature's own Retribution for failure of responsibility regarding this obvious preparation for final coup de grace.

This day, most truly intelligent men and women realize that, in spite of our own weaknesses, the real violence in this nation is not originating from our own people but from Washington and proximity where laws of commission and omission, not of the people, are being formulated for captivation. There can easily be heavy bloodshed in our beloved nation for far exceed results of past riots. Any bill resembling those mentioned, if passed, will, to my mind, constitute a threat to internal security.

When 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence, in grave danger, mutually pledged to each other their lives, their fortunes and their sacred Honor, nothing could have been further from their minds than to ask the people to jeopardize their personal protection by any such misplaced trust. Nor would it have been forthcoming. The Law pertaining to potential danger of tyranny does not change. The greater power must remain in the hands of the people or they are finished.

Let's face it. No man in his right mind is going to disarm himself, his family, and his nation farther at a time like this. He is not going to let anyone trifle with his final protection, inch by inch, and he is not going to forfeit mastery of his own home. As Benjamin Franklin said, "They that can give up essential liberty to obtain a little temporary safety deserves neither liberty nor safety". And I say to you, "Any person who knows not the meaning of personal sovereignty knows no true sovereignty at all -- therefore, no Liberty. It is, because of this, far more justifiable for the people to jealously suspicion the government than for that government to suspicion the

Library Reading Program Runs Through August

Summer reading is in full swing at the Nyssa public library. Theme of this year's program is "Tuck a book a week away."

All children grades 1 to 9 are invited to join the contest which will continue through August 31. To be eligible for an award a minimum of 10 books must be read. Records of the children's progress will be kept on cards at the library.

Next fall the cards will be presented to the students with the following awards: 10-19 books read, ribbons; 20-29 books, certificates; 30 or more books, certificates with gold seals.

This project is in cooperation with the libraries of Ontario and Vale. Books will be mailed to anyone in the county who is unable to visit a library.
