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Smith Named To Medical Program Advisory Board

A Nyssa man, Charles J. Smith, has been appointed to the Regional Advisory Board of the Oregon Regional Medical Program for heart disease, cancer, stroke and related diseases. Dr. Herman A. Dickel, Portland, Board Chairman, announced today. Smith is Assistant Administrator of Holy Rosary Hospital, Ontario.

A native of Emmett, Idaho, Smith attended the University of Idaho. He was graduated from the Mercy Hospital School of Nursing, Nampa, Idaho in 1950. Following two years service in the United States Army Medical Corps in the Alaskan Theatre, He attended Mercy College, Detroit, Michigan and was graduated from Mt. Carmel Mercy Hospital School of Anesthesia in 1953. He served as staff anesthetist at Mt. Carmel Mercy Hospital in 1954 and in the same position at St. Luke's Hospital, Boise, Idaho from 1954 to 1957. He was appointed Administrator of Malheur Memorial Hospital, Nyssa, Oregon in 1957 and remained in that capacity until accepting his present position at Holy Rosary Hospital.

He is a member of the American College of Hospital Administrators, the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists, American Hospital Association, Association of Western Hospitals, Oregon Association of Hospitals, Idaho Association of Hospitals and the Catholic Hospital Association. He resides in Nyssa with his

He has served as secretary-treasurer and president of the Eastern Oregon Area Council of Hospitals and as secretary-treasurer and vice-president of the Idaho Association of Nurse Anesthetists. Secretary Association, International, Ontario, Oregon.

The 35-member Oregon Regional Medical Program Board is composed of health professionals and representatives of the public and is responsible for supervision and progress of the program. The Oregon program is one of 53 regional medical programs in the nation established by Congress to encourage the rapid and widespread application of medical knowledge on heart disease, cancer, stroke and related diseases through cooperation arrangements among medical professionals.

Seven projects have been funded to date in the Oregon region. They include training coronary care nurses, traveling

circuit courses for physicians and health personnel, and four stroke projects designed to provide early identification and treatment of "stroke-prone" patients.

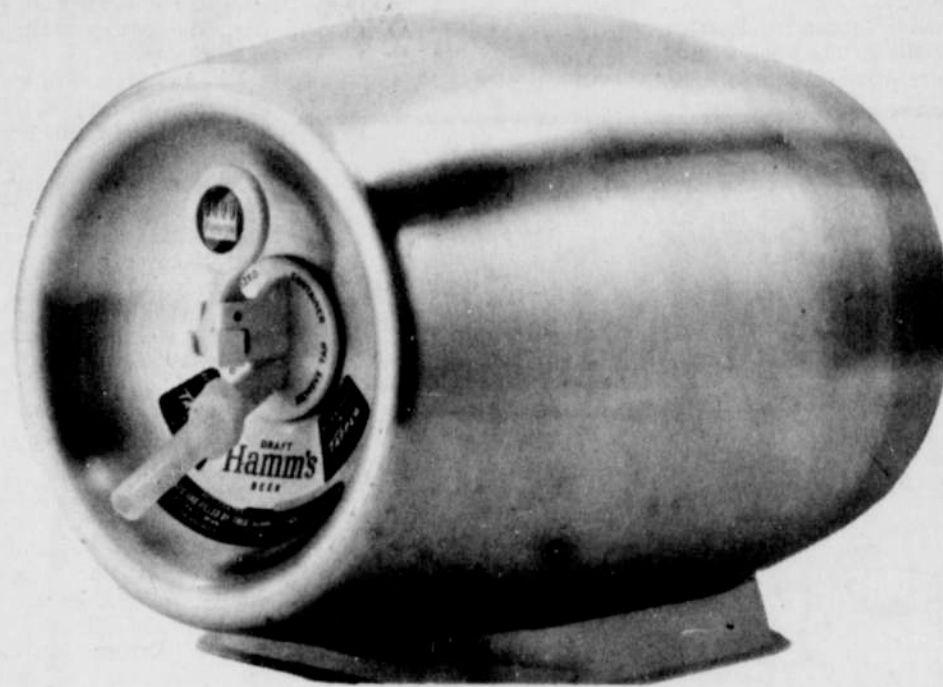
CLUB NEWS
