MINUTES OF THE MALHEUR COUNTY COURT MEETING - JUNE 5, 1968.

Called to order by Judge Ellis A. White with Commissioners Jacob Fischer and E. W. Maag present.

Adopted the resolution to call for bids on a car, pickup for the Sheriff's department and two compact cars for the use of other departments, with the County retaining the right to reject any or all bids.

Malheur 4-H Horse Show To Prelude County Fair

The Malheur County 4-H Horse show will offer an exciting prelude to county fair next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, it is announced by County Agent Roger Fletcher.

Approximately 120 4-H horsemen will gather at the fairgrounds in Ontario for the two and one-half day program. Events such as showmanship, horsemanship, ground training, junior classes, demonstrations and judging contests will punctuate and accentuate the show.

Much time, effort and energy on the part of Malheur County 4-H horsemen have gone into preparations for this program. Earlier events this year such as the 4-H saddle horse field day on May 4, and the 4-H saddle club play day on June 15 were basically designed to allow the young equestrians training opportunities in preparation for the show.

Judging this years program will be Mrs. Barbara Holladay of Klamath Falls, and Philip Kuhl of John Day. Both are recognized 4-H horse judges in the state and will offer the program opportunities for instruction, as well as evaluation.

The horse show this year is an expanded program over previous years, due to a steadily increased involvement of Malheur county youth in 4-H Horse Projects. The need was recognized for expanded learning

opportunities and experiences. Consequently, it was decided by the County 4-H horse advisory council to initiate expanded 4-H horse show involvement.

Never before, has a ground training class been a part of the program. This was introduced to encourage young horsemen to work with their horses from the beginning as a colt. It creates opportunities for horse and rider, or trainer to proceed through the program each year, terminating a given year's project by testing their competency in graduated testing fair events. From the ground training class, these young horsemen will graduate into the junior class which is an event designed for riders handling horses four-years-old, or younger, which are still on a snaffle bit or straight hackamore. Subsequently, they will step into the regular horsemanship classes which call for the utmost of skill and demonstrations of competency.

In addition, all 4-H horsemen will be involved in a horse judging contest which is a program designed to offer young horsemen an opportunity to evaluate various classes of horses. Too, all contestants in the horse judging contest will be asked to substantiate their placing on any given class through logical, concise and significant reasons. And finally, each youngster can step into adult shoes and accept the role of teacher through demonstrations.

Though the events referred to in the 4-H horse show are called contests, the program likes to refer to them instead as

"experiences conducive to learning." It is really an informal educational enterprise designed to enhance youth integrity, safety, citizenship, leadership and responsibility, Fletcher stated.

The public is cordially invited to attend the program which begins at 9 a.m. Monday, August 12 and concludes Wednesday noon. The entire show will be conducted in the area of the grandstand at the county fairgrounds.

WORK SMARTER - NOT HARDER

STAINLESS STEEL TABLEWARE is not absolutely stain-proof. How much or how little staining will occur depends on the composition of the tableware and the way it is finished.

Certain foods have proved to be somewhat corrosive to stainless steel. Mustard is the worst offender. Other foods which may cause stains are tea, coffee, lemon juice, vinegar, mayonnaise, cream and vanilla.

Tableware should be rinsed immediately if it is to stand before sudsing.

FROZEN ORANGE JUICE CONCENTRATE should be placed immediately in home freezer storage and kept frozen until used. Marie Tribble, Oregon State University Extension nutritionist, says the safe storage period in the ice cube compartment of the refrigerator is one week; in a combination ice-cube-freezer compartment, three months; and in the freezer, one year.

Be sure to keep the juice frozen until you're ready to use it. If the freezer fails and the concentrate thaws, use it as soon as possible.
