Mr. and Mrs. Delmar Milton and two sons of Bellingham, Wash., spent August 16-17 with their uncle and aunt, the Earl Campbells.

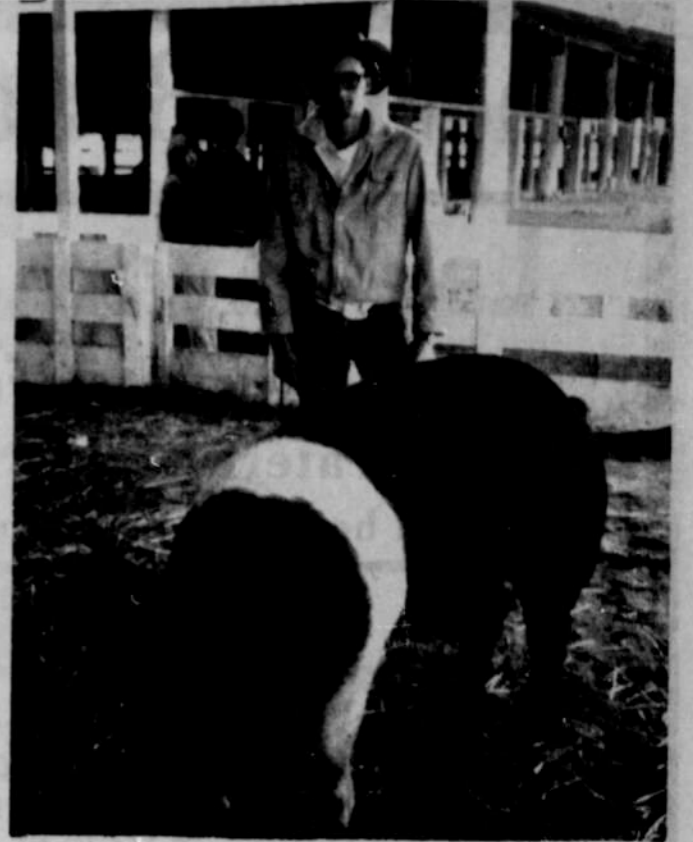
Mrs. Dale Witt was an August 18 dinner guest of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Begeman.
