Root Critical Of Opponent's Voting Record

"The incumbent Democrat congressman from this district has been nothing more than a rubber stamp for the Johnson-Humphrey Administration's policies of mismanagement," stated Marv Root, Republican congressional candidate. Root, campaigning recently in Pendleton, pointed out that his opponent has been trying to convince Second District voters that he has broken with the foreign and domestic policies of Lyndon Johnson and has set a separate course.

"All the campaign rhetoric cannot disguise the fact that my opponent has voted down the line for virtually every domestic and foreign policy bill asked for by the Johnson-Humphrey Administration," Root said. "My opponent supported the Administration's domestic 'great society' bills on 75 percent of the roll-call votes," stated the Republican candidate. "This overwhelming support in the 1967 session of Congress is actually higher than his support in the previous session. My opponent has become more pro-Administration rather than less so."

"In contrast, my opponent's fellow Democrat supported the Johnson-Humphrey program on only 69 percent of the votes and his two Republican colleagues

supported 'great society' legislation only 43 percent and 51 percent respectively. My opponent has supported the Johnson-Humphrey Administration to a far greater extent than any other Oregon congressman or senator. These figures were taken from the highly respected 'Congressional Quarterly'."

"A total of 76 percent of 2nd District residents do not want their congressman to support domestic 'great society' legislation, according to a poll taken by Public Affairs, Inc. of Salem," Root said. My opponent is clearly at variance with the views and needs of his constituents."
