Deadline Nears On Elk Permits

Elk hunters are reminded that they have but five more days in which to apply for either sex elk permits, with the deadline for submitting applications for inclusion in the drawing set for 5 p.m., August 27. The drawing to determine successful applicants will be held at 10 a.m., September 4.

Hunters are advised that applications must be received at the Game Commission's Portland headquarters by the 5 p.m. deadline to be eligible for the drawing. Applications received after that time and date will be processed only if unclaimed permits remain following the drawing.

Malheur Court Officials List Aug. 14 Action

At their August 14 session, the Malheur County Court approved the policing of the city of Vale to be incorporated into the Sheriff's department. The contract will be drawn by District Attorney Clifford Looney and Vale City Attorney William Schroeder. \$17,500 annually is to be paid to the county by the city of Vale, plus payroll costs and fringe benefits.

Court members agreed to oil 1 3/10 mile of road at Willowcreek; 1 1/8 mile of the Kochsmeier Road; and seal coat 7 miles of Foothill Drive. Williamson Roofing Firm of Fruitland was awarded the bid for repair of the courthouse roof for \$286, to be completed within 30 days.
