Because vision is such an essential factor in child development, visual ability can affect a child's school achievement, his social adjustment, and some of his physical capabilities such as hand-eye coordination. If his visual capacity is limited, his interest in activities and endeavors it affects is likely to be limited. Thus, a child's personality can be, in large part, molded by his ability to cope with visual tasks.

The great tragedy of all this is that most children with visual handicaps do not know that they are seeing improperly they assume that the way they see is the way everyone sees. Thus, the responsibility for a child's visual welfare, like all other responsibilities for him,


