HUNTING PROSPECTS

PHEASANTS SO-SO

hunting areas include the Blue
and Wallowa mountains in
northeastern Oregon.

Quail gunners will find a
bonanza this fall, especially in
eastern and southeastern Ore-
gon. Numbers are high and
coveys large. Valley quail are
the most numerous and will be
found around all agricultural
areas as well as the adjacent

canyons and bottomlands. Look
for the mountain quail in the
brushy draws and canyons. This
should be an excellent year for
the hunter with a good quail
dog.

Chukar hunters can expect
fair to excellent gunning, de-
pending on the area hunted. In
some areas populations are up,
in other areas about the same
as last year, and still other
areas the number of birds are
fewer. From all 'dormation at
hand, chukar hunting will be
only fair in the Deschutes can-
yons, fair to good in the John
Day and Malheur drainages, and
good to excellent in northeast-
ern Oregon. The breaks of the
Imnaha and Snake rivers should
be the hot spots. However, in
almost all chukar areas, hunt-
ers will find pockets where the
birds will be plentiful.

It looks like a so-so year
for the pheasant gunner. More
and more habitat is being des-
troyed by urban development as
well as by changes in agri-
cultural practices, and pheasant
production was not the best this
spring. Populations in the north
Willamette are about the same
as last year, but gunning will
be slower in the south end of
the valley. Production is down
in the Umatilla area also and
about the same in the popular
Ontario-Vale country. Gunning
is expected fair to good around
the Wallowa, Baker, and La
Grande areas.

DEER SCATTERED

Deer hunters are expected
to have another fine season, al-
though below the high success
made last year. Production is
reported good in most areas
of the state, and survival is
excellent as a result of the most
open winter experienced in a
long time. Very little mortality
occurred on any of the big game
winter ranges. August rains,
however, scattered the animals

all over the countryside, and
green feed is again abundant.
As usual, the John Day drain-
age almost throughout its length
will be tops for mule deer
hunting, as will the adjacent
drainage slopes. Top hunting is
also expected in the Wallows
and much of Baker and Union
counties. The Heppner area is
a good choice. Production is
good in most of central and
northeastern Oregon, and ma-
ture animals came through the
winter in fine shape.

In southeast Oregon hunters
will have to work for their
bucks. Production on the desert
ranges this spring is again low,
although the winter carryover of
mature deer is quite good. Some
nice bucks will be found in the
Steens, Pueblos, Whitehorse,
and Mahogany mountains, but
they will be tougher to come
by than in other areas of the
state.

It should be a fine year for
elk hunters, depending on
weather, but the expected high
hunting pressure on the elk
herds will force them into hiding
much of the season, keeping
hunter success low. Hunters
will find a few more large, ma-
ture bulls around this fall, the
result of the shortened season
last year. These large animals
showed well during the winter
inventories. Production is good
in most areas.

Probably the best producing
areas will be the Wenaha,

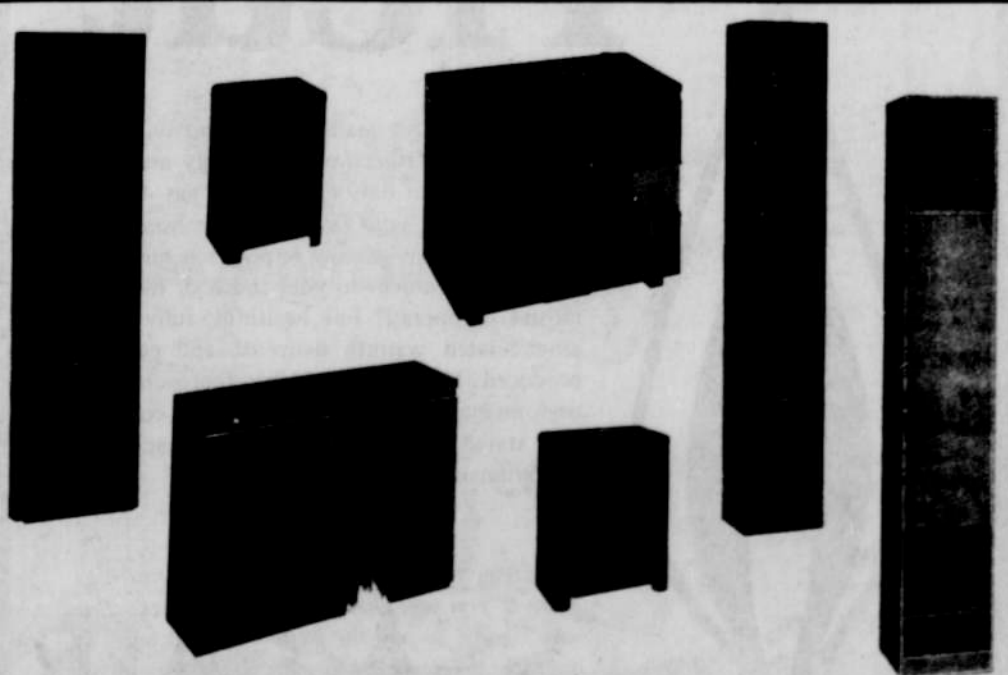
