UNIVERSITY WOMEN TELL PLANS FOR OCT. 5 SESSION

The Ontario branch of American Association of University Women heard Hollis Jones of Vale discuss Pakistan at their Sept. 9 meeting. Jones spoke on the "Gap Between The Rich and Poor Countries", pointing out many ways that Pakistan and the East are behind the Western countries.

The speaker lived in Pakistan for five years, while working as chief of security for the building of a dam there.

In his comparison he showed slides of transportation in the country, agriculture, discussed the lack of sanitary facilities, food, dress, customs and to some degree religion.

Asked about foreign aid money going into the country, Jones stated that he felt from observation and discussion with others that most was going into the pockets of the speculators. He told the group that roads and transportation are so poor in Pakistan. He stated that wheat and other supplies shipped from the United States into the back areas of the country, where many of the people in greatest need live, is virtually impossible.

He cited an example of a man who would have to travel several days leading his water buffalo out from the hills to get the "free grain". He could only carry back what he could carry on his animal and his head and would probably eat as much as he could carry back.

In other business the AAUW group discussed the upcoming visit of Dr. Shirley McCune, AAUW associate director from Washington, D. C. Dr. McCune, Oregon President Mrs. Robert Every of Corvallis and Mrs. Robert Moser of Warrenton, state implementation chairman, will visit the Ontario branch Saturday, Oct. 5.
