## Adrian Blanks Panthers 19-0

Adrian, behind the running of Pud Franks and the defensive play of Burdette and Mark Pratt, John Phelps, Bill Grace, Mike Duncan and George Gonzales, handed Parma its fourth setback, with a 19-0 final score Friday, Sept. 27 on the Panther field.

Franks gained 105 of the Antelopes' total of 195 rushing yards. He also scored 18 of Adrian's 19 points. Adrian coaches report that they feel that main point of the team's success Friday was outstanding defensive efforts of the Antelopes. They held Parma to 12 yards rushing and 75 yards on passes.

They also recovered three Panther fumbles and turned two of them into touchdowns. Franks recovered the first fumble on the Parma 25-yard line and later scored from the one-yard stripe.

Midway through the second-quarter, Mark Pratt recovered a fumble on the hosts' 35-yard line and Franks scored from the four-yard line five plays later. This gave Adrian a 13-0 halftime lead. The Antelopes' final score was made on an 80-yard drive, with about seven minutes left in the fourth-period, climaxed by a four-yard drive by Franks.

This week Adrian, with a 2-1 record, will play a tough Nampa Christian team on the NNC field. The Idaho team is also 2-1, and is tied for first in that league, with a 1-0 record. Game time is 3:30 p. m. Friday. This will be the AHS squad's first league contest.

The Nyssa Junior High Bulldogs shut out Payette by a 14-0 score, Sept. 20 on the hometown field.

The touchdowns were scored by Max and Paul Elguezabal, and the extra points were added by John Bernal and Rod Lewis.

The NJHS grid youths, playing a rugged defensive game, stopped a determined Vale team 6-0, Sept. 27 on the Vikings' gridiron.

Nyssa's TD came late in the second quarter on a brilliant 55-yard punt return by Rod Wilson.

According to the NJHS coaches, an outstanding performance was made by John Bernal, who averaged eight yards per carry on offense and was a bulwark on defense. Other outstanding players were Gilbert Flores, Jerry Wilson, Pat Ross and Paul Elguezabal on defense.

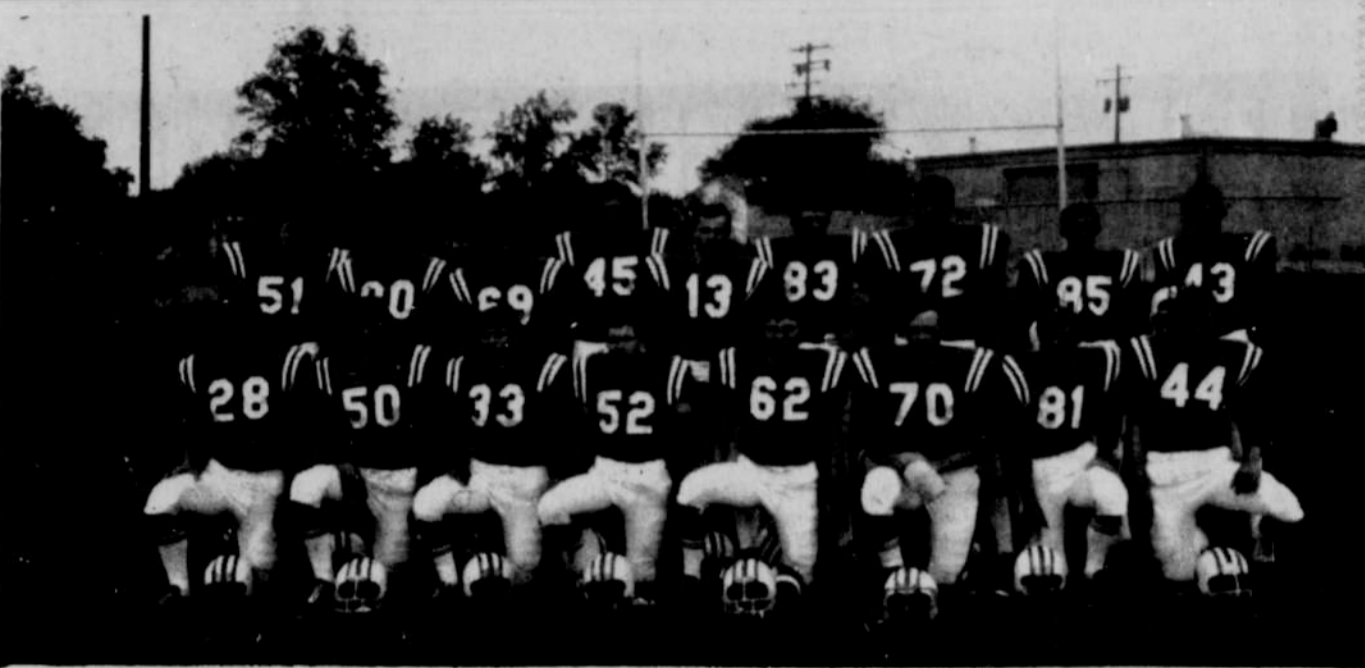
