Work Smarter - Not Harder

A COMMON CANNING PROBLEM is incompletely sealed jars, says Marie Tribble, Oregon State University extension nutritionist. Be sure to use regular canning jars and lids from the same manufacturer.

Check to see that there are no chips or cracks on the jar lip. Wipe it clean after filling and follow directions for processing time -- heat helps obtain a tight seal with self-sealing lids. Do not re-use self-sealing lids.

If directions aren't followed you may wind up doing a lot of hard work in vain and still have to question the safety of your product. Food preservation is a science and proper techniques must be used.

BEFORE YOU PUT SUMMER CLOTHES AWAY, make sure they aren't starched. Silverfish feed on starch and can cause damage during the off season.

Washable white garments may yellow during storage if body oil is left in the fabric. The oil is invisible at first, but with aging, discoloration occurs. Make certain also that all soap has been thoroughly rinsed from the fabric. It's a good idea to put white garments through the wash cycle with a half cup of packaged water conditioner and without soap before winter storage. The conditioner removes any soap residues.

WORK SMARTER - NOT HARDER

A NEW BRICK FLOOR IN AN ENTRANCE WAY should be treated with a brick sealer to make it easier to keep clean. Then wax occasionally with a polishing or self-polishing wax. After that, only sweeping, vacuuming or damp mopping should be needed for several months.

CHECK YOUR CAMPING GEAR before it goes into winter hiding. Make sure tents and

sleeping bags are clean and completely dry. A thorough sunning and airing before storage will help prevent mildew.

HOW MUCH FISH WILL FEED YOUR FAMILY? Velma Seat, Oregon State University food marketing specialist, recommends that you figure one pound of fillets to serve three people. One pound of steak will make two or three servings and a pound of dressed fish will give two servings.

Red snapper is an economical main dish. It costs about 16 cents per serving, based on three servings to a pound.

AS A CONSUMER YOU HAVE A RIGHT to complain if you aren't satisfied with what you buy.

But there's a right and a wrong way to write a complaint letter. Tell your story simply, give facts. It doesn't pay to be sarcastic. Write politely, pleasantly, but firmly.

Type your letter if possible. Of course, what you have to say is the most important thing, but a letter that's brief and concise without being curt will get faster action. Put yourself in the most becoming light so that what you say will carry weight.
