**FAITH LUTHERAN CHURCH NOTES**

It is announced by Pastor Orville Jacobson that at 8 o'clock Friday evening, Oct. 11, Gilbert Pond, regional representative of the Bethel Bible Series, will present an introduction to this unique study of Scripture at Faith Lutheran church.

The series originated in Madison, Wisc., at Bethel Lutheran church and more than 150,000 adults have studied the program throughout the United States.

The idea of the series is that through 40 lessons, over a two-year period and with the use of 40 symbolic paintings, the students can grasp the basic Christian concepts and retain them. This gives incentive and background to probe deeper into Christian understanding and witness.

All members of Faith Lutheran church are urged to attend, and all other interested individuals are cordially invited. The Bible series has been effectively used by all Christian denominations.

The week of Oct. 13 will be emphasized by the Faith Lutheran congregation with a 'preaching mission'. The Rev. Arnold J. Melom, serving West and East Olaf Lutheran churches in Byron, Minn., will speak during the 10:30 morning worship service Sunday, Oct. 13 at Faith Lutheran.

Each evening, Sunday through Wednesday, he will also speak at 8 o'clock. Theme of Pastor Melom's addresses will be "The Christian Home: Redemptive Unit of Society."

Possessing a vital interest in the home, the speaker has concentrated some effort in counselling in home problem situations, and has served as banquet speaker for both youth and family groups. He has also served as Bible instructor for several Bible camps.

Pastor Melom was graduated from Luther Theological seminary at St. Paul, Minn., and has served congregations at Detroit Lakes, Howard Lake, as well as the East and West Olaf Lutheran churches in Minn.

**EUGENE BUTZER**

Funeral services for Former Nyssa Eugene Butzer of 1260 Quinn Road in Woodburn, were conducted Oct. 3, 1968 at Ringo-Cornwell funeral chapel in Woodburn.

The Rev. Garry McLain officiated, and interment was in Forest Lawn Memorial Park at Gresham.

Mr. Butzer succumbed on Sept. 30 at a Salem hospital, following a brief illness.

He was born Feb. 20, 1896, near Bern, Switzerland, a son of Fredrick and Lena Simonet Butzer.

The deceased came to the United States in 1919 and two years later was married to Elizabeth Seybold at Pittsburgh, Pa. They moved to Portland about 35 years ago and Mr. Butzer was employed as a tool design engineer by the Iron Fireman Co., and later by Hyster Co.

In 1958 the Butzers moved to Nyssa, going to Woodburn Senior Estates six years later.

Mr. Butzer was a member of the Hubbard Community United Church of Christ, the American Society of Tool Design Engineers and the Gideons.

In addition to his widow, he is survived by a niece, Anna Regan of Portland; a brother, Edward Butzer of Bern; several other nieces and nephews.

At suggestion of the family, memorial contributions are being made to the Oregon Heart Fund.

**Weekly Sermonette**

**TROUBLE - MAKER !**

He is Johannes Gutenberg, the man who invented movable type.

Gutenberg had a hunch it would make a printer's work easier if type could be used over and over again in various combinations. Before his time, printers carved entire texts on large blocks of wood. Gutenberg, experimenting, sawed up one of these blocks into individual letter-units.

His idea worked. It made printing a great deal easier. But the ruckus it was to cause would have astounded this humble and devout German craftsman. For movable type not only simplified printing, it made possible for the first time the distribution of ideas to large numbers of people.

Under the interchange of ideas, serfs became restless, national states developed, and feudalism crumbled. Revolutionary trouble-makers such as Voltaire, Tom Paine, and a group of uncouth pamphleteers in England took ideas directly to the people. They found print was the ideal way to express complex thoughts. It was true then, and it is true today.

Printing made possible modern newspapers. Good newspapers always make trouble. They're trouble to officials who want to carry on the public's business in secret. They are trouble to anyone with entrenched authority. They're often troublesome to those whose private lives become suddenly caught up in the public business.

But the work that newspapers do has become a basic link in our political process.

That's something for you to think about during National Newspaper Week Oct. 6-12, 1968.

**FIRE PREVENTION**

Last year in the United States, 12,200 persons lost their lives in fires. Thousands more were injured. Property damage resulting from fire reached a staggering \$1.7 billion. With care, a huge portion of this shameful waste could have been avoided.

During the week of October 6 to 12, all of us will be asked to redouble our efforts to cut down on this enormous toll of life, limb and property; to check our homes and places of business against hazards which might at some unexpected moment burn us out and threaten our very persons; to remind ourselves that fires can indeed be avoided through the exercise of care.

As T. Lawrence Jones, president of the American Insurance Association, reminds us, Fire Prevention Week is "not just another crusade to be taken lightly." It was conceived, and is repeated at this time every year, as a deadly serious reminder to all Americans that fire prevention is a relatively simple task, but one which must be kept in mind at all times.

How simple it is, for example, to put that cigarette- or match- out before discarding it, rather than tossing it carelessly away, perhaps to kindle a fire with consequences you will never forget.

How simple to clean out that kitchen stove, rather than taking the risk of a badly charred room or gutted home which can be the result of an accumulation of grease.

Fire Prevention Week is a time to think of these things; to throw out old newspapers and other unneeded collections of combustible materials; to check- or have a serviceman check- electrical appliances and wiring and heating equipment. It is a time to pledge ourselves to making fire prevention a year-round job.

That is the message Fire Prevention Week seeks to convey.

Can any of us afford not to listen--and act?
