

CASCADE PRESIDENT ELECTED TO BOARD OF NATIONAL ASSN.

O. Marshall Jones, president and director of Cascade Natural Gas Corp., of Seattle, today was elected to a two-year term on the American Gas Association's Board of Directors.

Elections were held during the concluding session of the 50th annual convention of the gas industry's national trade association. Some 5,000 gas industry executives from the United States, Canada, Europe and South America participated in the four-day event.

A graduate of the University of Washington with a degree in economics and business, Jones served as a Certified Public Accountant with a national accounting firm for four years.

He then joined General Contractors and a group of sub-contractors for 12 years, first as treasurer and later as vice president. In 1956, Jones joined Cascade Natural as vice president-finance. He was elected president and director in 1958.

Jones also is a member of the Board of Directors of the Pacific Coast Gas Association and a trustee of the Association of Washington Gas Utilities.

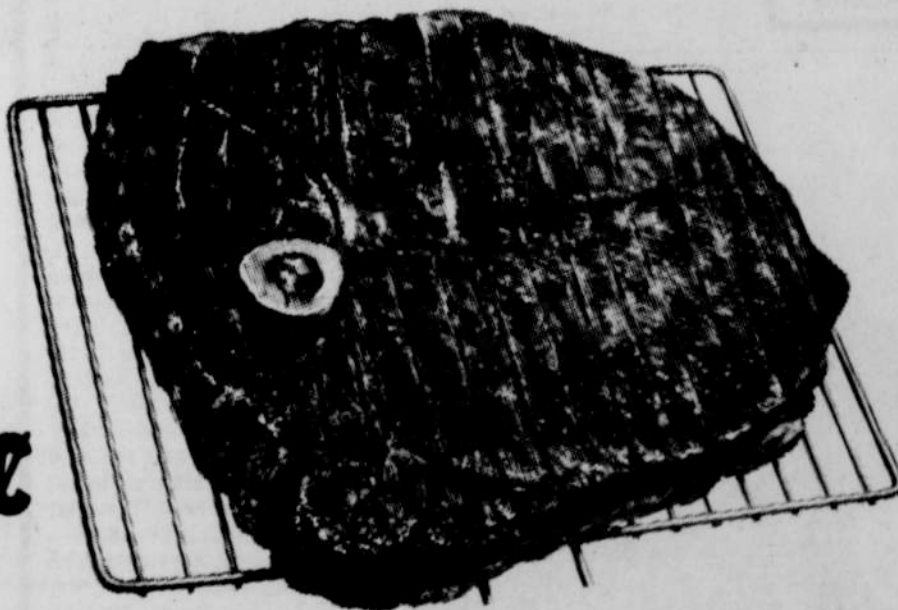
