

AAUW Official Urges Action In Community

Dr. Shirley McCune, associate director of American Association of University Women, told members that this country is in its 11 o'clock hour and called for members and branches to become pacesetters in their communities.

The AAUW officer spoke at a joint brunch meeting of the Ontario and Baker branches held Oct. 5 at the La Paloma cafe.

According to Dr. McCune, this country is reaching a critical time not because of lack of ability of its people but because of lack of will. She listed four points which she considers keys to the problem. They are lack of involvement in the political situation, poverty, racism, and the technological monster this country has created which does not relate to needs of the people.

Dr. McCune ask AAUW members to take a look at their communities and assess their problems, look at resources to determine objectives and finally to get involved in the action. She cited some examples of ways that AAUW branches had handled such projects.

In discussing "community action" programs, the speaker told the group that women look at problems in a different light than men. She illustrated her point by having members write down problems of their communities.

As she predicted, the majority was concerned with feeling-type problems, such as education and welfare. Men tend to be more concerned with task-type problems, she stated.

Dr. McCune said that women tend to use "floodlight" rather

than "spotlight" logic and seem to be more aware of things encircling the problems. Women are less aggressive in their approach to the problem, she said.

She told the group that in light of these differences there is a great need for women in community public service such as on school boards and county commissioner posts.

She called on AAUW, as a voluntary association, to help define some needs of the community by calling attention to problems and helping to match resources to the needs. She told the women to "speak to the establishment" saying that it is easy for a congressman to ignore a single letter regarding a problem, while it is a completely different matter if there is a number of letters or one from a large group.

Dr. McCune, whose advance degrees are in sociology, was accompanied to Ontario by Mrs. Robert Every of Corvallis, Oregon division president; and Mrs. Robert Moser of Warrington, division implementation president.

A membership coffee preceded the brunch session. Mrs. Norman Poole was in charge of the coffee hour with Mrs. M.S. Ingebritsen in charge of the brunch arrangements.
