NHS Students Consume Large Amounts Of Food

Would you believe that approximately 1,100 Nyssa students consume 120 pounds of weiners, 1,100 buns, 30 pounds of potato chips, 30 gallons of corn, 32 gallons of liquid jello, and 1,100 pieces of cake at a single meal? It's true and not only that, they also consume 23 pounds of margarine and 1085 cartons of milk a day. During a month 3,200 pounds of flour, 400 pounds of sugar, 200 pounds of powdered sugar, and 300 pounds of brown sugar are also used.

Of a possible 1,300 students, 1,100 facilitate the cafeteria every day. Mr. Dirick Nedry, business manager, stated, "We really appreciate the high percentage of students eating in the cafeteria." Because of the many students using the cafeteria, Nyssa is one of the very few schools in Oregon that can still offer their meals at 20¢ to grade and elementary children and 25¢ to high school pupils.

Nyssa school system receives a lot of food from the

government, but the bills still total more than \$5000 a month. Head cook, Mrs. Sadie Butcher, commented, "I think the students behave themselves very well while waiting in line."

Measure One Would Add 60,000 Veterans For Farm Home Loans

An additional 60,000 Oregon veterans would qualify for State veterans' farm and home loans if Measure 1 is approved by the voters in the general election November 5, the Department of Veterans' Affairs reported today.

The measure, which amends the constitution, would offer the loan to persons who entered the Armed Forces from Oregon and served 210 days or more, any part after January 31, 1955, the end of the Korean War. They would have 20 years following their discharge to apply.

A distribution by counties of the some 60,000 Oregon ex-servicemen of the post-Korean War period shows that 607 of these entered service from Malheur County and would be entitled if the measure passes. An additional 9,000 veterans returning to Oregon every year starting in 1969 would also qualify.

Measure 1 would also broaden entitlement for some 2,000 World War II and Korean veterans by extending the World War II ending service date for loan eligibility from December 31, 1946, to July 25, 1947, and by providing that any one day of the required 90 days of service for World War II and Korean War veterans' entitlement may have been within the respective war periods. Presently the entire 90 days must have been within the war dates.

If Measure 1 passes it would hunting in that area.

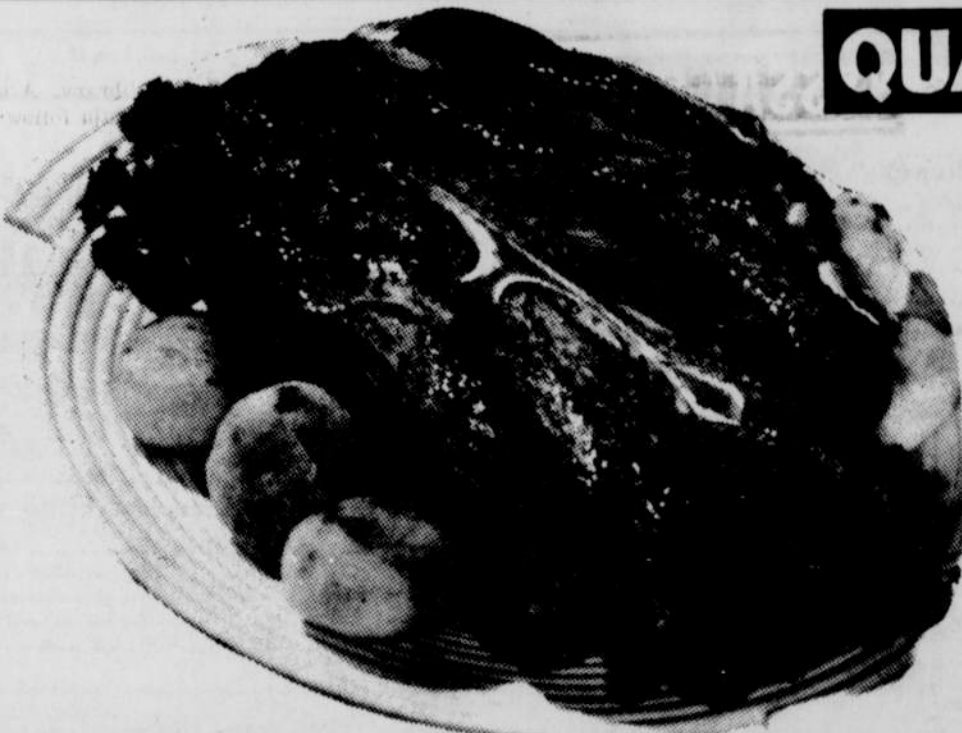
