Conduct Rules Of Early Day Students Told

"Don't stay up late at night, neglect your studies, fail to read your Bible daily, spend your evenings down town, waste time or money..."

These were just a few of the admonitions in the handbook provided incoming students at Oregon Agricultural College, now Oregon State University, back at the turn of the century.

The University's 100th year observance begins Oct. 27. Students were told to "Keep up, keep busy, keep good company, keep off the streets at night, keep your hands out of your pockets, and keep out of trouble."

"Don't whisper in the library, put off writing your junior oration until the last week, smoke on the campus, keep company with 'any old thing,' or make your room a livery stable," continued the book for freshmen distributed through the courtesy of the OAC, YMCA and YWCA.

An earlier version of the handbook, published in 1894, advised that all students were required to work an hour each

school day. For additional labor, they were to receive 15 cents per hour.

"By this, industrious students may lessen their expenses," they were told.

At one time, lest there be a misunderstanding, the young people were given these rules of conduct:

"All students are expected and enjoined on Sunday to attend the church of their choice or that of their parents or guardians.

"There will be no holidays except two days at Christmas--only then at the option of the faculty."

"All communications between ladies and gentlemen on the college premises are expressly forbidden.

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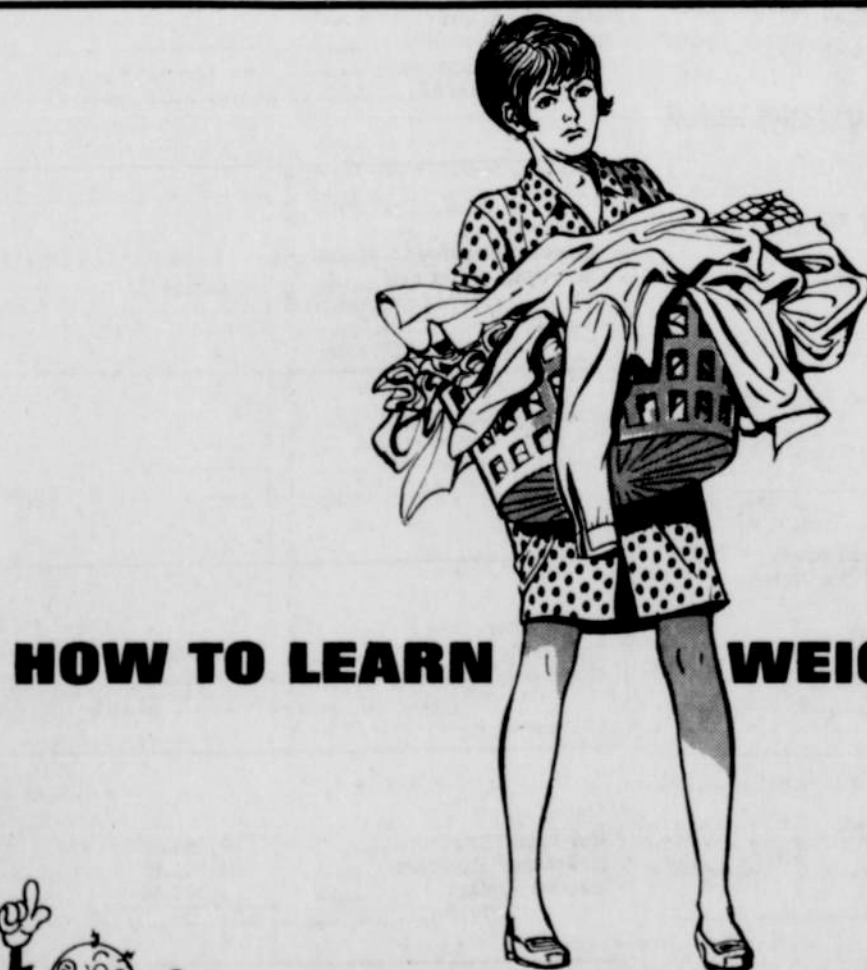
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
