CONGRESSIONAL REVIEW NEEDED

The National Labor Relations Board, in judging the relationship of unions, management and employees, "displays such flagrant bias that our free-bargaining system is seriously impaired," say authors George Denison and William Schulz in the August Reader's Digest.

In an article entitled, "Let's Enforce Our Labor Laws Fairly," they cite case after case to prove that the Board shows "unabashed bias" in many decisions, and they cite the opinions of leading experts as to the devastating effect of these rulings.

Sen. Robert Griffin, co-author of the Landrum-Griffin Act and a top labor expert, says: "Those who suffer from the Board's twisted and distorted rulings are individual workers, small businessmen and the public at large."

Guy Farmer, former NLRB chairman, says that the intent of Congress has been systematically thwarted by the Board in sanctioning union abuses while restricting management rights. In fact, says Farmer, the delicate balance between labor and management has been so altered that "the process of free collective bargaining is rapidly approaching a complete breakdown."

Dr. Herbert R. Northrup, industrial relations professor at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School, says: "In its zeal to enhance the power of no-longer struggling unions, the Board has ignored basic justice and trampled cherished freedom."

There is sufficient evidence in the Reader's Digest article to warrant a full-scale review by Congress of labor law to determine how it can more effectively serve the public interest.
