County Agent Gives Venison Cooking Tips

Venison can be cooked and served in a variety of ways. A quick frying of thin steaks is probably the best way to cook and serve venison, according to Helen Dwell, Malheur county agent.

It's easy to do and the meat from either an old or young deer can be delicious.

The steaks should be cut 1/4-inch to 3/8-inch thick, fried in a sizzling hot pan for about 90 seconds on each side, seasoned with butter or bacon grease.

The timing is critical since the thin steaks should be fried just enough to brown the outside and leave the center gray or slightly pink.

Venison should be cooked the same as low quality beef. Roast tender cuts, like loin and rib, and cook others with moist heat.

Be sure to remove all venison fat before cooking. This will help to eliminate the gamey flavor. If fat is needed ground pork or beef fat may be substituted.

Vinegar, tomato sauce and French dressing sauces are good for tenderizing venison.
