Here Are the Simple Rules

Any boy or girl living in this territory (excepting near relatives of any employees in this business office) may enter this campaign. Correspondents are not employees in the business office and members of their families will be allowed to compete.

Entrants must have written consent of parent or guardian who will be expected to help their candidate.

In event of a tie for any one of the prizes, each tie candidate will be given a prize identical in value.

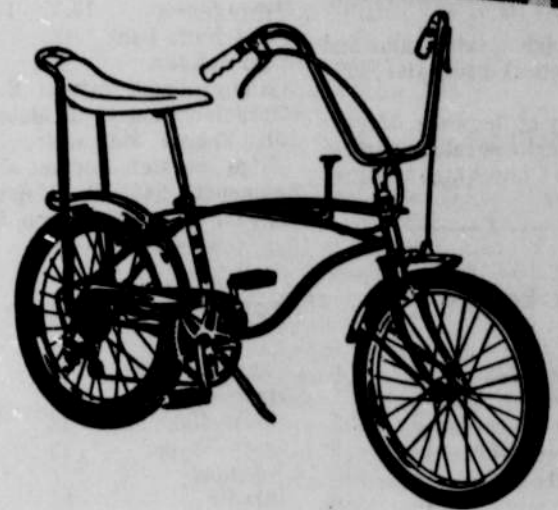
