UNDEFEATED NJHS 'DOGS' PLAY FALCONS

The Nyssa Junior High Bulldogs overpowered the Payette Pirates Oct. 18 on the Payette field. The final score was 13-7. Nyssa's first touchdown came at the beginning of the second quarter on an outstanding effort by the defensive team. After having pushed the Pirates back to the ten-yard line, Nyssa line-men Gilbert Flores and Jerry Wilson caught one of the Pirates running backs with a driving tackle and forced a fumble. The ball rolled back into the end zone and alertly, Don Sappe fell on the loose ball for a Nyssa TD. The conversion attempt by Wilson split the uprights.

The final touchdown for the Bulldogs was also recorded in the second period on a 30-yard pass play from Quarterback Rod Lewis to Wingback John Bernal. The conversion attempt failed. Nyssa's final game will be played Friday, Oct. 25 against Valluave on the home gridiron. This is a very important contest for the local lads because it could mean the eighth-grade SRV championship title if they win.

It is hoped that many townspeople will turn out to see this fine young team in action in its last football game of the 1968 season. Game time is 3 p. m. - Ron E. Bone and Dennis Urry, team managers and reporters.

13-0 SRV A-1 football victory. The NHS youths fought hard throughout the game but were unable to overcome the Payette squad.

This being their first league win, the victory boosted the Pirates to a 2-5 over-all record. Setting up the first touchdown was Jim Smith. Within the remaining two minutes, he raced 21 yards to the Nyssa eighty-yard line. Four plays later, Dennis Fee racked up the first points for the Pirates.

In the eight seconds remaining, Smith broke his way off the tackle to race some 41 yards for a Pirate TD. The extra point was then boomed over the goal post for another point for the Payette lads.

The Pirates led the rushing yards with 229, compared to the Bulldogs' 152, but the NHS squad passed 47 yards, while Payette passed 31. Nyssa accumulated 15 first downs, compared to 11 for the Pirates. The Payette team was penalized 25 yards and the Bulldogs had 20 yards against them. Nyssa has failed to record a victory in five games and has tied only one game, while losing six in over-all play.

Bullpups Bite Huskies; Set For Wolverines

Bring On Weiser! Bring On Weiser! This was the cry of Coach Harry McGinley's NHS Frosh-Soph football boys as they boarded the bus for a recent return trip from Emmett.

The Bullpups had just upended the Emmett Huskies by a score of 19-6. In the process, the fighting 'Pups' ran their winning streak to three in a row and had evened their season record at three wins and three losses. The young NHS lads had already a 6-0 contest over a tough band of Antelopes from Adrian and a 27-0 romp over the Ontario Tigers.

The local team kicked off to Emmett and it was soon evident that the hard-nosed Nyssa defense was going to play another important role in this game as it pushed the Huskies back, forcing them to punt on a fourth down.

Ron Moffis ran the punt back 15 yards to the Nyssa 46-yard line. On the first play from scrimmage for the Bullpups, Mike Smith set his sights on the goal post and didn't stop running until he had hit paydirt 54 yards away. Brian Feik's kick was just a foot wide to the left. After this opening explosion the game settled down into a defensive battle by both teams for the remainder of the half.

After intermission the Huskies, with the help of two key penalties, drove 46 yards for their only tally of the evening. They failed to run in the extra point.

Then to cap this drive, Chester, on the last play of the game scooted 25 yards to the Emmett 15-yard stripe before he was bumped out of bounds.

Coach McGinley commented, "it was fine team effort and I hope all of the boys will display the same spirit, pride and dedication when they move up to varsity play next year."

The NHS Bullpups have only the one game left, and it will be at 4 p. m. on Monday, Oct. 28 on the Weiser Wolverine's field.
