The Towers, a guided missile destroyer, received word that the Marine pilots had been hit by ground fire. They were flying as spotters for the battleship USS New Jersey, who along with the Towers, was providing gunfire support for the Third Marine Amphibious Force.

The pilots were spotted as they parachuted into the water about three miles off the coast. A small boat was sent out when the pilots were within 100 yards of the Towers. The small-boat crew was surprised when one of the pilots greeted them with, "What's for chow."

During the 26-day operating period the aircraft carrier's pilots attacked more than 40 assorted artillery and anti-aircraft sites, destroyed or damaged 70 trucks, and left nearly 60 barges sunk or damaged.
