FLETCHER'S CORRAL BY ROGER FLETCHER, MALHEUR COUNTY AGENT

A TRIBUTE TO STEVE BESSE

Six years ago 150 pounds of explosive energy invaded Malheur County and our Extension office. R. Steve Bess, packing 17 years of marketing and promotional experience from international and national sales responsibility with Ferry-Morse Seed Company in San Francisco, arrived in this county in February of 1963 to assume the role of Extension Agent to Malheur onion and potato growers. His contribution to this segment of our agricultural industry has been significant; so much so that his competencies in this field have been widely recognized.

Last week, Oregon State University's Extension Director, Gene Lear, announced the appointment of Steve Besse to the Chairman Agent position in Lany County at Eugene. With this appointment comes both administrative and subject-matter responsibilities. Lane County, with a staff of nine agents, executes one of the largest extension programs in the state. Knowing Steve, he will more than rise to the task.

Steve's contribution to our onion and potato growers exemplifies the conscientious and relevant effort our total extension program aims for. For example, promotional and advertising efforts for the county's 4500 acres of onions have been held at a minimum due to the unavailability of appropriate funds. It was likewise frustrating to note that Idaho onion growers were attempting the same minimal promotional program. Could there be a combined enterprise?

It's Your Law!

The Missing Worker

Jake was a good farm hand and Mr. Jones did not want to lose him. So when Jake wanted to go work on another farm, Jones paid him several months wages in advance in order to persuade him to stay.

Jake stayed on, but at the end of the first month he told Jones that he was going to quit. "You can't quit now," said Jones. "I paid you in advance. You have to stay and work out what I paid you."

Can Jones force Jake to stay and work on his farm?

"No," say the courts. A farm laborer, working for a monthly salary under a verbal contract has a legal right to end his contract and voluntarily leave his employer's service at the end of a month. In fact, if notice is given such an agreement can be terminated by either party at the end of any month.

An employer acts at his own risk in overpaying, rewarding or giving incentive bonuses to an employee. Attempting to force the employee to stay on and work out the balance after the time when the employee may legally quit could constitute involuntary servitude in violation of the federal constitution.

Jones has a legal right to make Jake pay back the money advanced, but he cannot legally stop Jake from quitting.

the USDA, considered mutual concerns and opportunities. It was suggested that a combined promotional and advertising program be conducted. There must have been unanimity, because effective this past spring, following an Oregon-Idaho growers referendum, the Idaho-Oregon Onion Promotion Committee was established. This combined enterprise has allowed for a promotional budget of 40 thousand dollars. It is beyond the realm of coincidence that local onions are now reaching areas of our national markets hitherto unreached.

The potato industry has also felt the impact of extension's practical application through Steve. Another example: When Steve first arrived in the County in 1963, potato growers sprayed heavily against the flea beetle. That summer Steve, in cooperation with growers and OSU entomologists, conducted field sweeps for flea beetle identification. Scrutiny showed that there were insufficient numbers of injurious flea beetles to warrant extensive control measures. Subsequent surveys, through the present, have verified the original find. Consequently, such control measures were discontinued. The resultant discontinuance of unnecessary control (costing about \$4 to 5 per acre) has conceivably saved local potato growers one quarter of a million dollars over the past five years!

Steve's extension responsibilities have also included research, legislative processes, Malheur County's Labor Sponsoring Association and Migrant Education through TVCC.

While the many products of grower accomplishment have resulted from Steve's enterprising efforts, it has to be recognized that these successes are the product of splendid grower cooperation and encouragement. A tribute to Steve has to be accented with a tribute to the cooperative situation in which he worked.

We bid you a warm and fond wish, Steve, for still greater experiences in the new and stimulating challenges ahead.

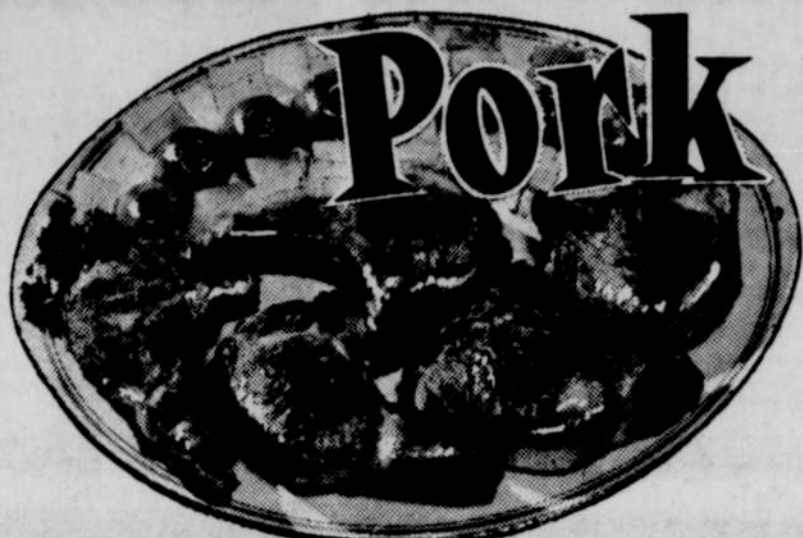
