C. LOUIS GARRISON

Services for Charles Louis Garrison were conducted Thursday, Oct. 31, 1968 at the L. B. Hall Memory chapel in Grants Pass, Ore. Officiating was the Rev. Charles McCarthy of the United Methodist church there. Cremation followed at Hillcrest Crematory in Grants Pass.

Mr. Garrison succumbed on Tuesday, Oct. 29, following an extended illness.

He was born August 31, 1903 at Atchison, Kans., a son of Charles Leonard and Ada Ella Freeman Garrison.

At an early age, he moved with his parents to Colorado, attended schools in Union, Colo., and Nyssa, having come to this area in 1916.

The deceased later attended Reed college in Portland for one year and was graduated from the University of Idaho with a degree in electrical engineering.

He was married July 18, 1929 to Mary A. Shepard in Idaho.

The couple was residing in San Francisco, where Mr. Garrison was assistant superintendent of the Electrical Company, when he suffered severe injuries in a tragic accident which took over a year for him to recuperate. The couple moved to Grants Pass in 1940 where the deceased managed his own foundry.

In addition to his widow of the home, he is survived by two brothers, Ray L. of Klamath Falls, Ore., and Dale Garrison with his wife, Mrs. Charles (Gladys) Newbill of route 1, Nyssa and Mrs. John W. (Vera) Olsen of Nyssa.

Mr. Garrison was preceded in death by his father on Oct. 22, 1957, and by his mother on July 23, 1966.

Among those attending the Oct. 31 rites were Mr. and Mrs. Dale Garrison, Mr. and Mrs. Duane Holcomb, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Newbill and Mrs. John W. Olsen. The Newbills and Mrs. Olsen also visited in the Ray L. Garrison home in Klamath Falls, returning home Friday.

BUYING U. S. BONDS

The Wall Street Journal recently mentioned a discussion by V. Presidential candidate Spiro Agnew drawing the criticism of the Treasury Secretary. The Republican candidate called attention to the purchase of a \$100 U. S. Savings Bond (costing \$75.00) which, if the current rate of inflation continued through maturity of the bond, would be worth only \$62.50 based on current values. Secretary Fowler said, "Maligning U. S. bonds is a disservice to the country."

This ceases to be a matter of patriotism we think, and if the government debentures go down that much in value a great share of it can be placed upon the Federal government who has done so much to live beyond current income.

There is a very nice appearing man in the Portland office of the Treasury who calls on us about once each year and asks us to carry ads for the Treasury advising people to buy bonds. We have refused and given him these reasons why we will not: (1) - It has appeared to us that other investments would bring a higher interest return - thus, if this is true we would not want to influence anyone to buy bonds; (2) - The government has money to pay this man's salary but none to pay for the advertising he asks to run free; (3) - And, what we consider the most ironical of all, the P. O. department says these are ads if we run them and charges the newspaper the same rate as that portion of the paper carrying local retailers' ads (upon which a higher rate is charged than on news). So -- if you never see any ads advising purchase of U.S. bonds in this paper you'll know why. And, this in spite of the fact that it takes money to support fighting men. Let's pay the bill and not rely on the patriotism of a few of our citizens and a small segment of industry.
