Malheur County young people will have an opportunity to become involved in an entirely new project area this fall. Boys and girls with a particular interest in animal medicine will hold the 4-H Veterinary Science program in fascination.

A sick animal has much the same pain and discomfort humans have when sick, but is unable to relate this illness unless the person caring for the animal has developed a keen sense of observation and an understanding of normal body functions.

Although knowledge of the structure and function of the animal's body is basic in preserving the health of an animal, it alone is not adequate. An animal owner should also know something of the forces that work against the animal in destroying its health.

Just as important, is a knowledge of how to prevent diseases. The old saying "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" certainly applies to a 4-H project animal. As youngsters study the health of animals, they will gain a better understanding of their own personal health since the same medical principles apply.

Animal ownership in this project is not required. The only requirement is that a youngster have access to some type of animal. Species such as dogs, cats, rabbits, guinea pigs, mice, birds, domestic livestock, poultry, or any other pet may be used. The program is suitable to all youth who have an interest in animals, medicine and public health.

As can be seen, the 4-H Veterinary Science project has been designed to help rural and urban boys and girls to better understand their animal's health and possible means of preventing disease.

Veterinary science goes far beyond the animal since it also involves the protection and promotion of human health, through
