

## WASHINGTON GETS FIRST FISH PLANT IN UNITED STATES

ABERDEEN, WASH., Oct. 21, 1968--Private business and the U. S. Government joined hands today to combat world malnutrition.

A contract to design, build and operate the nation's first, large-scale fish protein concentrate (FPC) pilot-demonstration plant was awarded today to Ocean Harvesters, Inc., Los Angeles, by the Department of Interior, Bureau of Commercial Fisheries (BCF). The contract announcement was made here by Julia Butler Hansen (D), Congresswoman representing the third District of the state of Washington.

Mrs. Hansen said the plant will be built on a one-and-a-half acre site in Aberdeen in a development district of the Port of Grays Harbor.

She said that the eventual cost of design, construction and first-year operation of the new facility will be more than two million dollars. This plant is scheduled for operation during the 1970 fishing season.

Ocean Harvesters, Inc., is owned equally by Star-Kist Foods, Inc., Terminal Island, Calif., a subsidiary of H. J. Heinz Company, and Sweco, Inc., Los Angeles. Star-Kist will have fish procurement and operational responsibilities for the new plant. Sweco will have plant design, fabrication, assembly and equipment installation responsibilities.

Fish protein concentrate is a high-protein powder, manufactured from hake, a member of the codfish family. FPC from hake was approved by the Food and Drug Administration for human consumption in February, 1967. Light tan in color, FPC is virtually odorless and tasteless. It contains more than 80 per cent animal protein and a number of nutritionally beneficial minerals. A BCF report said the concentrate blends well with other foods and materially enhances their nutritive value. It has been successfully tested as an ingredient in beverages, soups, gravies, noodles, bread and cookies.

### FIGHTS MALNUTRITION

Later commercial production of FPC, according to Howard W. Wright, Jr., president of both Ocean Harvesters and Sweco, will be especially significant in terms of the world's food problem. "We are embarking on a joint business-

government effort to combat malnutrition, and especially protein deficiencies, in many parts of the world," he said.

### BIG INDUSTRY

U. S. government sources estimate that billions of pounds of fish suitable for use in a concentrated protein form are to be found in U. S. coastal waters. The same sources estimate that the U. S. catch alone, now approximately five billion pounds, could be expanded three to five times.

approximately one billion people for 300 days at a cost of less than one-half cent per person per day," Mr. Wright said.

Mr. Wright stressed the demonstration character of the planned facility: "Its success could lead to construction of other facilities whose total output would be a significant factor in combating world hunger. We hope to demonstrate the almost limitless potential of fish protein concentrate as an answer to one of the world's most pressing problems."

Star-Kist Foods, Inc., one of the world's largest fish and fish product processors, was acquired by H. J. Heinz Company in 1963. It distributes tuna, frozen seafood, mackerel, sardines, cat food and fish derivatives on a global basis. In addition to its canneries and main offices at Terminal Island, Calif., it operates facilities in Peru, Puerto Rico and American Samoa.
