

Young Couples Given House-Planning Tips

Most young couples have a dream house in mind, but they don't always have the experience to judge the suitability of house plans before they take the plunge to build or buy their first home.

For them, Oregon State University Extension home furnishings specialist Dorothy F. Brown proposes some "thought" questions to help in the decision-making process. "Where will the children play?" Consider this question, Mrs. Brown says, because most mothers like to be able to supervise activities from the kitchen, preferably without going up or down steps. When the children are outside, windows that permit a view of the yard save time and energy. They should be low enough for seeing the area close to the house.

When children and adults are being entertained at the same time, can noisy activities be separated from quiet conversation? Family rooms that adjoin living rooms without a door or other sound barrier won't do it. Can the television be separated from areas for reading and study?

While checking quiet and noisy areas, Mrs. Brown suggests thinking about the parent or child who needs to sleep while others in the family are active. A door to the bedroom hallway can help here. When the bedroom door is closed, and the hallway door too, good sound insulation can be achieved. Soundproof wall partitions between the bedroom area and activity area can be effected with staggered studs and acoustical materials.

The traffic pattern in a house can make or break the livability of a floor plan, Mrs. Brown points out. Here's her recommendation for analyzing it:

elect by increasing margins in 1962, 1964, 1966 and 1968.

He was elected Majority Leader in 1964 and was re-elected to the post in 1966. Since 1965, he has been chairman of the Interim Committee on Public Lands, which has drafted legislation vital to usage and development of state-owned lands in Oregon.

Smith, 37, was appointed to the Public Land Law Review Commission by Gov. Mark Hatfield. He was reappointed by Gov. Tom McCall.

In 1957, Smith was honored as Junior First Citizen of Harney County and he was chosen as one of Oregon's Three Outstanding Young Men in 1961. He has twice been nominated as one of America's Ten Outstanding Young Men.

Band members were waiting for us and we were soon assigned to our Corvallis hosts for the evening. The Nyssa band was to play a pre-game and half-time show for the Corvallis High school homecoming game with Albany that night. However, the field was so muddy that they didn't march, but accompanied their Corvallis band hosts to the game. Again, the hospitality of our hosts was wonderful and we all had a good time despite the rain.

We expected a wet, muddy game Saturday, and were equipped with plastic rain gear and prepared for the worst, so were most pleasantly surprised to awaken to beautiful, sunny weather. The field at Parker Stadium is well drained and by game time the turf seemed quite firm, the players had pretty good footing, and we watched the game in our shirt sleeves.

The band practiced for about an hour in the morning, took a brief tour of the campus, and OSU officials provided a box lunch at noon which was eaten on or near the buses. Keep Out Of My Yard

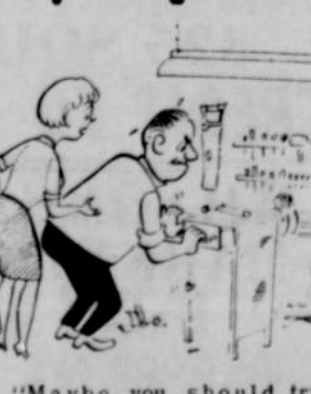
Madeline was upset by the neighborhood children playing in her yard. It seemed as if a troop of kids stormed across her yard every hour of the day. Regardless of how often she yelled at them, they seemed always to return. During the school year, her yard was used as a short-cut.

Madeline finally decided that she had had enough. She started a law suit against the children and their parents seeking damages for the harm done to her property by the children running across it. She also asked for an injunction to stop the children from coming onto her property. "Our children weren't doing any harm to her property," said the parents. "Children certainly have a right to play outside."

Do you think Madeline can prevent the children from playing in her yard? Yes, said the court in just such a situation. The children had repeatedly and willfully interfered with and trespassed upon Madeline's property. They also threatened to continue such trespasses. In light of these facts, the court found the children guilty, but assessed damages at only six cents.

The court also granted an injunction against the children and their parents, preventing them

In order to maintain the utmost secrecy as to the number of subscriptions and votes secured by each candidate during the last three days of the campaign the race will be brought to a close under a sealed ballot box system. No subscriptions or money will be accepted from candidates during the last three days of the campaign; instead the candidates will deposit their final collections and subscriptions in the sealed ballot box located in the office of this newspaper. The campaign manager will collect from subscribers who come to the office to pay and will put slips and money in the ballot box for whatever candidate the subscriber designates to receive credit. If any candidates cannot come to the office they may mail their report to the campaign manager who will see it gets in the sealed box, providing it arrives by the closing hour. Candidates will have access to this sealed ballot box any time.

The candidates will simply place their money and subscriptions in an envelope which will be furnished them, and deposit it in the sealed ballot box.
