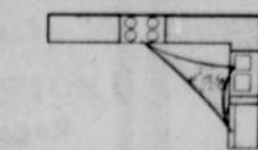

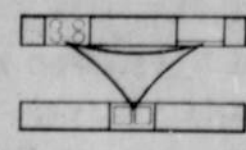

BASIC KITCHEN ARRANGEMENTS:

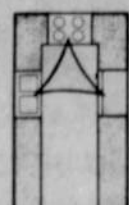
Since the preparation and serving of meals are the chief uses of the kitchen, it is best to plan the location of the sink, refrigerator and range carefully. The path between these units should form a triangle whose three sides total not more than 24 feet.



The "L" shaped kitchen allows space for eating, laundry, or other family activity.



The "Corridor" kitchen makes effective use of a small area or becomes the natural alternative where a wall is not available for an "L" or "U" shape.



The "U" shaped kitchen saves the most steps and provides the most working area in proportion to size.



LAZY SUSAN

The space saver for "problem" corners. A gentle touch turns the revolving shelves. Available in both base and wall cabinets.



LID CABINET

Stores lids, trays and similar items on edge for easy access and selection. Slides out with fingertip touch; saves space, too.



MIXER SHELF
