SAFE DRIVING TIPS

You wouldn't buy a car without windows, so why would you drive one with all its windows fogged or iced over?

Drivers peering through a few inches of smear-cleared windshield, completely unable to see to the rear and sides, can be observed every cold morning. These drivers are forced to make foolish and dangerous moves--they might as well be driving blindfolded!

Clean windows are one of your least expensive and most effective winter driving precautions, an Oregon Traffic Safety Commission spokesman said. The Commission listed the following reminders for window care.

Allow a few extra minutes on cold mornings to clean fog, ice or snow off all windows, not just the windshield.

To warm up the air and prevent condensation inside while you travel, start the engine, heater and defroster a few minutes early, too.

Wash the windows often. Dirt, road film and squashed bugs intensify headlight glare and increase windshield streaking.

Windshield washers should be filled with a solution of windshield anti-freeze and water.

If your windshield wiper blades cause streaking, have them checked. The tension may need adjusting, or the blades may need to be replaced. Even if they aren't worn-looking, the rubber may be dead from exposure.

Clean the inside of windows, too. Smoke and dust accumulation decrease visibility.

WORK SMARTER - NOT HARDER

If you've heard rumors about radiation from color TV, this information from the National Safety Council may put you at ease.

They quote the author of an article from the Journal of the American Medical Association as saying, "...it is my unbiased opinion, after reviewing the available material, that the publicity over color television receivers and X-Rays has been rather inflated. If a color television is well constructed, properly maintained, operated under specified conditions and utilized under good viewing habits, then it can afford much pleasure and need not be considered a health hazard."

By "good viewing habits", we usually mean to watch it six to eight feet from the set.

VETERANS' WIDOWS EDUCATIONAL AID

An estimated 1,386 Oregon widows of veterans who died as the result of military service will be eligible for up to 36 months of educational assistance from the Veterans Administration beginning December 1, R. J. Novotny, Manager of the Portland VA Regional Office, said today.

He pointed out that starting December 1, the wives of Oregon's 998 totally and permanently disabled veterans will also be entitled to VA educational assistance payments of \$130 a month--up to a maximum of 36 months--for full-time institutional training.

LIMITS NOTED

The allowance for three-quarters time training is \$95 a month, with \$60 being paid for half-time training under the new law granting these widows and wives VA educational help for the first time in the history of veterans' benefits in the United States, Novotny said.

Widows and wives now eligible for this benefit will have until December 1, 1976, to complete their training under this new program, Novotny explained.

He said that women who become eligible in the future for VA educational assistance due to the service-connected death or permanent and total disability of their husbands will have eight years to complete their training.

MARRIAGE REMOVES

Eligibility of widows and wives does not depend on when their husbands served in the Armed Forces. However, Novotny added, if a widow remarries or a wife divorces her

disabled husband, she loses her entitlement.

Novotny emphasized that it will not be necessary for eligible widows and wives to contact the VA for detailed information on this new program.

In the near future the Veterans Administration will mail explanatory material with widows dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC) checks and with the compensation checks for totally and permanently disabled veterans.

CHILD PROBLEMS FILM SHOWING AT NHS MONDAY

Gaston Smith, Psychologist and administrator of the Malheur County Family Service clinic will present "If These Were Your Children," an educational film dealing with children's behavior within the classroom situation. The film will be shown January 13 at 3:40 p.m. in the Multi-purpose room of the Primary school. It is a 49 minute motion picture which is planned to stimulate thought, discussion and constructive action among individuals and groups who live and work with children. The film is divided into two parts, the first which depicts individual children with various problems within the school setting; the teacher and how she deals with these children, their problems and their parents. 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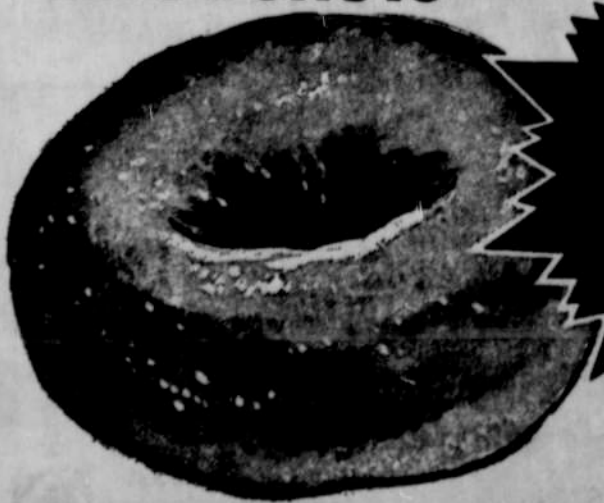
