



JOHN PETTLEY . . Knife and Fork Speaker

A London-born Englishman, Pettley, who is the exception to the rule that Englishmen have little sense of humor, will entertain members of the Knife and Fork club at their next meeting slated to begin at 7:30 p. m. Thursday, Jan. 16 at East Side cafe in Ontario. The speaker claims it was almost a case of love at first sight as far as he and the United States were concerned. He had been sent here in 1946 to make a study of the applications of meteorology to movie making in the California Institute of Technology. After receiving a master's degree, he returned to England. But he stayed only a year and then "beat it back" to the U. S. He now is on the faculty of the Dunn School, Los Olivos, has an American wife and family of four, and is living the life and enjoying the customs of his adopted America. His talk, under the title "By Jove, Is This America?" is a recital of the humorous experiences that befell him as he began to forsake his inherited customs and replace them with those of the United States.

TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS KILL 645 PEOPLE IN OREGON IN '68

Oregon traffic accidents killed 645 people in 1968, a slight reduction from the previous year when 657 deaths were recorded.

The toll included 91 pedestrians struck and killed by autos.

The Department of Motor Vehicles says the 1968 toll is the lowest in four years. In 1966, 678 deaths were reported and in 1965, the all-time record was set with 680 traffic fatalities.

The agency said the complete

1968 traffic picture will not be known for several months when total accidents and injuries are tallied. Accidents generally total more than 70,000 a year with injuries around 29,000 per year.

The department said the 1968 toll is tentative and could go higher or lower if delayed deaths are received or if autopsies reveal persons now listed as traffic victims died from natural causes.

The month by month for 1968 was: January, 48; February, 35; March, 51; April, 53; May, 51; June, 60; July, 58; August, 59; September, 46; October, 61; November, 60; and December, 63.
