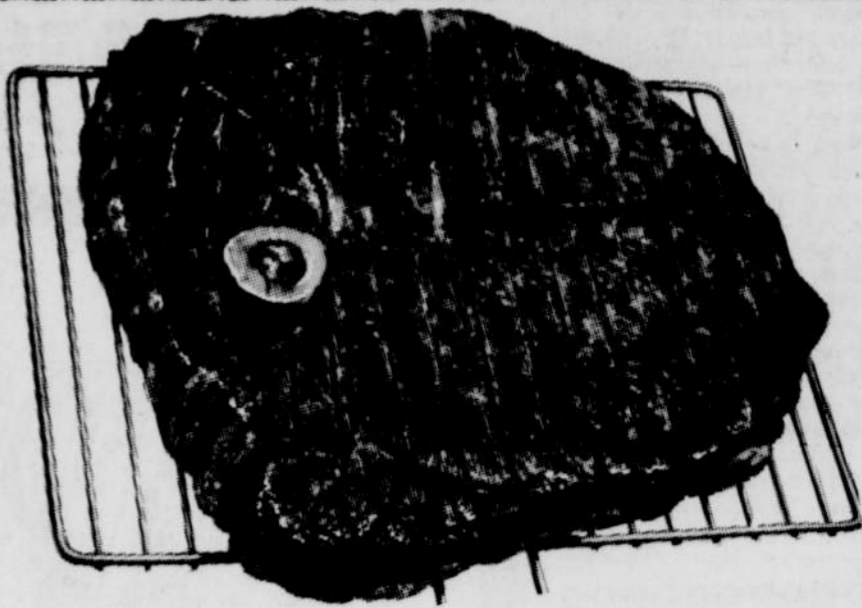
The women voted to make a quilt to be entered in the state contest and the chairman distributed stamped squares to be embroidered by club members before the next meeting.
