contributes about 24 per cent of the cost of local education. Under the Governor's program, the state would provide at least 50 per cent of the cost of education, thus decreasing the burden on the property tax.

These are just a few of the factors we must take into consideration, so you can see that this is a very complex subject with no easy answers.

As the property tax relief program begins to take shape, we can discuss these points again, with specific application to the bill.

Above all, however, we think it is fundamental that the people be allowed to make the final decision. It has been five years since an income tax proposal has been referred to the people, and it has been more than 20 years since a sales tax referendum.

We don't presume, as some do, to speak for the people of Oregon or to state with any certainty whether or not they want property tax relief badly enough to pay the price of an alternate revenue.

We feel that the people of Oregon are capable of speaking for themselves on this subject, and we are determined that they shall have this right.

We are both eager to hear of your ideas or suggestions about property tax relief, and look forward to hearing from you.

Report of Hospital Auxiliary Activities

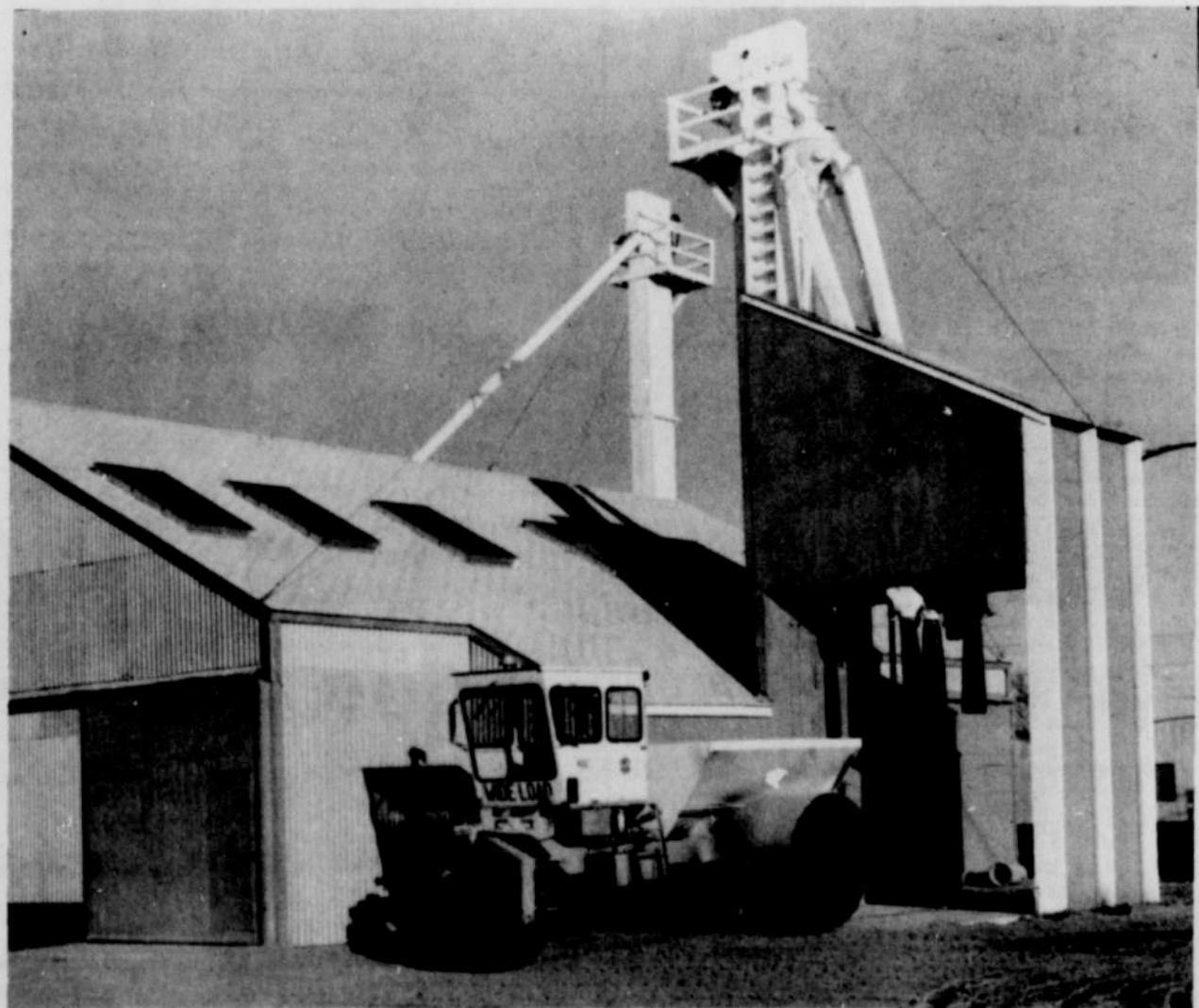
Jan. 27 was the date of the Malheur Memorial hospital auxiliary meeting. The ladies met for their regular business meeting at 2 p. m. at the hospital.
