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## Police chiefs say lighting combats crime and vandalism

"Good lighting is more important to a small town than a police force," according to a chief of police.

The nation's police chiefs are in accord that high-level lighting can be an important weapon in combating crime and vandalism, according to a recent survey by Sylvania Electric Products Inc.

Sylvania asked 1,300 police chiefs what effect lighting had on crime. The national poll disclosed that 87% of the chiefs replying felt that adequate lighting reduced crime and vandalism, and 85% reported a drop in crime rates when poor lighting was improved in high-crime areas.

Criminals and vandals shun well lighted areas, preferring to "work" in the dark, the survey showed.

After high-level illumination was installed, 42% of the police officials reported crime rates dropped 50% or more; 30% reported a 25% reduction, and 19% said the crime rate dropped 10%.

Officials cited public and industrial parking lots, street lighting, playground, and parks as the areas considered to be under-illuminated to adequately deter crime and vandalism. Some noted that improved lighting in industrial areas reduced nighttime breaking and entering.
