S. S. NUMBER IDENTIFIES TAX ACCOUNT

Your Social Security number is the key to the processing of Federal tax returns and should be put on all checks or money orders sent for tax payment, A. G. Erickson, District Director of Internal Revenue for Oregon, said recently.

Erickson said that if the taxpayer's check or money order becomes separated from his tax return during processing, the Social Security number on the payment will make sure it is properly credited to his account.

If a check without a Social Security number is separated from the return, he added, the payment is set aside, and the taxpayer may get a bill.

The check cannot be credited to the taxpayer's account in those cases until he has provided IRS the necessary information to identify the payment.

Erickson reported that last year IRS received more than 15 million tax returns with checks or money orders attached. In addition, he said, several million checks were received for payment of estimated taxes.

With this volume of checks received during the tax filing period, Erickson emphasized, taxpayers can be confident that their tax account is properly credited when they identify all payments with their Social Security number.
