Narcotics Agent Tells PTA Of Drug Hazards

"Educating your children and yourselves and knowing what to look for," is one of the best defenses against narcotics according to Mr. Bert Wilson, an investigator for the Idaho State Board of Narcotics. Mr. Wilson spoke before members of the Nyssa PTA, Feb. 13.

Mr. Wilson stated that it is very difficult to detect narcotics because pushers don't advertise and users won't tell on anybody. But when a pusher is caught he shouldn't be given a second chance.

He said narcotics such as marijuana, LSD, speed, demerol, pep pills are readily available to those who seek them. "I don't know of any community in the state of Idaho that doesn't have some users and I doubt that it is any different on the Oregon side of the Snake River," he asserted.

Most drug addiction begins with the use of marijuana. Users go from marijuana to other drugs and eventually to heroin. Figures show that 93% of people taken off of heroin will return to it. "There isn't much hope for a heroin addict, his life is very short," commented Mr. Wilson.

"Some students as young as

11 are known narcotics users. They start out sniffing glue, hair spray, gas fumes, etc. just for kicks and then graduate to stronger drugs. Once the habit is formed they will do anything to obtain money to keep the habit satisfied," said Mr. Wilson.

As a cure for the drug problem, Mr. Wilson suggested an intensive educational program in our Nyssa schools for youngsters from junior high through senior high age.

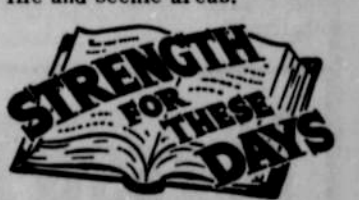
Malheur SWC Dist.
