LTC Maze entered the Army as an enlistee in November 1948 and completed basic training at Fort Ord, California. He then attended clerk-typist school at Fort Lee, Virginia, after which he was assigned as chief clerk of the 51 office, 7th Cavalry Regiment in Japan, where he served until April 1950.

He entered Officer's Candidate School at Fort Riley, Kans., graduating in October 1950. He then attended the Infantry Officer's Basic course at Fort Benning, Ga., completing the course in December 1950.

From January 1951 to November 1953, Colonel Maze was assigned to the 101st Airborne Division Training Center at Camp Breckenridge, Ky., where he was commander of a basic and advanced individual training company.

In January 1954, the Colonel was assigned to Korea where he served with both the 24th and 25th Infantry Divisions as assistant Regimental S3 until October 1954 when he was sent to Hawaii with the 25th Division.

A hearing was held in Ontario Tuesday, February 25 on the proposition of adding the area in the northeast corner of Malheur county to the Adrian Soil and Water Conservation district according to Leeds Bailey, County Extension Agent.

Robert C. Baum, Administrative Officer for the Oregon State Soil and Water Conservation District presided at the meeting. He took testimony as to whether or not farmers wanted the area included in the Adrian District.

Land owners present at the hearing expressed a desire for the annexation. They said that they felt that the area could benefit from soil surveys and engineering services provided by the district.

Baum said that he would recommend that the State Soil and Water Committee hold a referendum in the area on the annexation. Principal farming districts involved include the Cairo, Ontario, Oregon Slope and the Annex communities.

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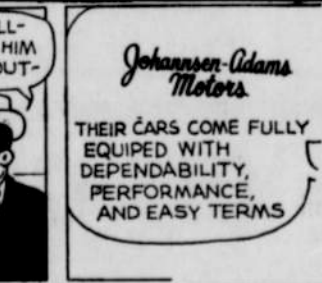
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
